MR. J. H. MYRICK will in a few days commence to build the "People's Market," on the site of the buildings recently destroyed by fire. The market buildings will be four in number—store, stable, smoke-house and ice-house. The store will be twenty feet wall, having a front on Grafton street of thirty-six feet, and running back a distance of seventy feet. The other buildings will be situated in the rear of the store, and will, in size, be proportional to it. The store, we are informed, will be divided into two departments, one of which will be used as a general grocery store, and the other as a fish and meat market.

Exhibition Notes.

THE Secretary of the Provincial Exhibition informs us that entries are coming in very rapidly. Yesterday (Market Day) a large number of entries in the different classes were made.

Intending exhibitors should forward their entries with as little delay as possible. The list for all entries of Live Stock will close next Friday, Oct 8th. Stock raisers should see that their Stock are properly entered in good time so that suitable space may be allotted for them in the show grounds.

As the Charlottetown Exhibition is open to the whole Province, doubtless, successful competitors at the County Exhibitions, will pour in their prize articles for general competition at Charlottetown.

The Prize animals from King's and Prince Counties, will in all probability share the honors largely with Queen's at the approaching Exhibition.

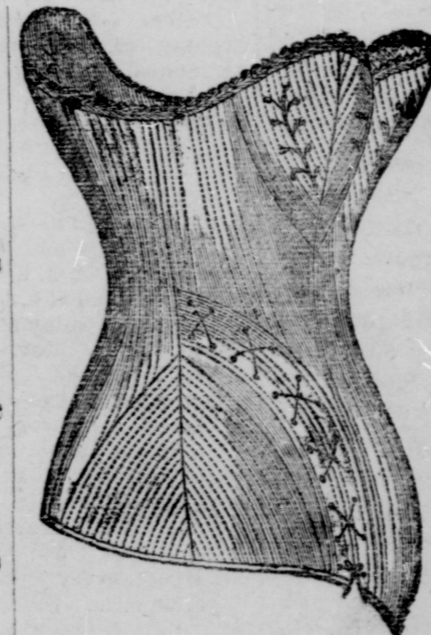
