Pages of History Turned In Landing Re-enactment

 After 430 years Jacques Cartier stepped from the pages of history Saturday afternoon and again set foot upon the shores of what he described as "the fairest land 'tis possible to see."

A dramatic re-enactment of his landing on the banks of the Kildare River was the highlight of Alberton's centennial day celebrations.

Several thousand expectant people assembled at Kildare River well in advance of the hour for which the landing was scheduled. They chanted with the Micmacs from Lemmon's Island reserve and inspected birch bark wigwams which had been erected. The tents of wood smoke from a camp fire filled the air. A three-year-old lad with a small toy pistol was observed taking careful aim at a tall Indian with feathered headdress. When he finally pulled the trigger there was no report and the Indian did not fall but there was an expression of satisfaction on the solemn little face.

LONGBOAT ARRIVES

At two o'clock all eyes were turned toward the river where a longboat with flags could be spotted in the distance. Strong arms at the oars brought it swiftly toward shore and two shallow water waders were manning the overboard and pushed it in. While the boat was still in motion the eager Jacques Cartier, accompanied by his lieutenant bearing the fleur-de-lis flag, leaped from the bow and with arms outstretched approached the natives who had gone down to the water's edge to see the strange boat and its occupants.
