THE Temperance Basket Picnic, held at Birch Grove, Freetown, yesterday, passed off quietly. In the early part of the day few were present, but towards evening a large number arrived in the trains from Summerside and Kensington. The Hon. J. B. Finch delivered an hour's speech, and short speeches were made by other prominent temperance men. Mr. Finch afterwards drove to Summerside, where he addressed a very intelligent audience in Ludlow Hall. His speech on that occasion is very highly spoken of.

THE congregation of Zion Church, in this city, have had their Church repaired and repainted in such way that, we are sure, it would now please the fastidious taste of our hypercritical correspondent, "Sleeper Cleydon." The outside of the Church was painted by Messrs. Taylor and Stenford of this city, and is plain, clean and becoming. The inside was done by Mr. Matthew Higgen, a skillful German artist, who has so blended and laid his colors that it is beautiful. The ceiling is of a rich sky blue, with handsome borders, and the pulpit and pews are of a fine canary color. Altogether the improvement of the Church reflects credit upon the congregation and the city. The Church will be opened to-morrow.

We clip the following from the Moncton Times of the 16th inst.:—"Our Methodist friends at Shediac have had to part with their much beloved and respected minister, the Rev. B. Chappell, who has had a call and been appointed to Summerside, P. E. I. Mr. Chappell, who spent two years here before (in this his first circuit), previous to his going to St. John, and thence to British Columbia, has for the past two years been stationed here, and we are not exaggerating when we say he has endeared himself to all with whom he has come in contact, that he has always been quite as popular with the congregations of other churches as with his own, and his departure is as much regretted by them. Last Thursday evening, at the usual prayer meeting, a very large number of persons assembled to take part in the proceedings, and bid him good-bye and God-speed, and after the closing ceremonies Miss Winnie Harper went forward and presented him with a purse of \$35 in gold, which she and Miss Gertrude Black had collected from his friends the day before. We hope he may long be spared in health and strength, and that his labors may be blessed, for we believe him to be a truly good man, and should it be so arranged in the future that he should again be appointed to this district, he can count on an enthusiastic welcome."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Sudden Death of Senator Chapais.

OTTAWA, July 18. Hon. Jean Charles Chapais, a member of the Senate, died suddenly this morning. Senator Chapais was a son of the late J. C. Chapais, Esq., merchant of River Ouelle, Quebec. He was born at River Ouelle, and educated at Nicolet College. He married a daughter of the late Hon. Amable Dumne, for many years a member of the Legislative Council of Canada. He was a member of the Executive Council, Canada, and Commissioner of Public Works, Canada, from March, 1864, until the Union. He was sworn Privy Counsellor in 1867, and was Minister of Agriculture from that date until 1870, when he was appointed Receiver General. He sat in the Quebec Union Conference in 1864, was therefore one of the fathers of Confederation, and is included in the group which forms the "Historical Painting," executed by Mr. R. Harris, now hanging in the corridor of the Parliament Building. He was a Government director of the Grand Trunk Railway. He sat for Kamouraska in the Canadian Assembly, until the Union, and for Champlain in the local house from 1867 to 1871. He was a Conservative, and was called to the Senate in 1868.

The Irish Land Purchase.

LONDON, July 18. In the house of Lords, Lord Ashburn presented the Irish Land Purchase money at 4 per cent. interest for 49 years where needed. The whole money will be advanced on conditions which, while just and generous, will not expose the Government to risk of loss. It is the aforeproposed in such cases to retain a deposit of one fifth of the purchase money at a moderate rate of interest until the tenant has repaid by instalments an equal sum. Also to utilize Irish Church surplus to guarantee the state from the ultimate loss, but only after the forfeiture of the one-fifth retained. Earl Spencer approved of the measure. Lord Ashburn said the Government proposed to limit the amount of money to be advanced to twenty five million dollars.

A Murderer Executed.

MOOSE JAW, July 18. Connors was hanged this morning for the murder of Henry Molaski on the 6th of April last. The execution took place at daylight. The murderer's neck was broken, the knot having been placed immediately in front of the ear. The body did not twitch, and the heart ceased to beat in nine minutes. The hangman was unveiled, and a jury of six held an inquest on the body.

The Troops Coming Home.

WINNIPEG, July 18. The troops had a quiet day yesterday, the promised review being a failure. The Simcoe Forsters and the York Rangers left on account of the rain. The Queen's Own Regiment of Toronto, the Royal Grenadiers, Ottawa Sharpshooters and Montreal Garrison Artillery, leave here to-day accompanied by General Middleton.

Other Chiefs Surrendering.

WINNIPEG, July 18. Premier Norquay to-day received the following despatch from Fort Pitt:—"Wandering Spirit and Sand Fly, with seventy lodges of Indians, have surrendered unconditionally and given up everything they had in their possession."

An Enormous Iceberg.

HALIFAX, July 18. The Norwegian bark Albion, which arrived here last evening, narrowly escaped collision with an enormous iceberg, which stood 160 feet above water, and was grounded in forty fathoms of water on the east side of the Grand Banks.

Shooting at Wimbledon.

LONDON, July 18. In Wimbledon, Volunteers believe the chief prize is likely to go to Canada. Sergeant Ashall has taken a high place in the competition.

The Mantrasna Murder Inquiry.

LONDON, July 18. Parnell's motion for a special inquiry into the Mantrasna murder case was last night defeated in the House of Commons, after an animated discussion.

The Russian War Cloud.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 18. The Journal de St. Petersburg says the Russian Government will do nothing to compromise the result of peaceful negotiations.

Nova Scotia Crops.

HALIFAX, July 18. Crop reports received from all parts of Nova Scotia indicate that the harvest in every line will be most abundant.

The Short Line Bill.

OTTAWA, July 18. The Short Line Railway Bill was passed in the Senate last night without division.
