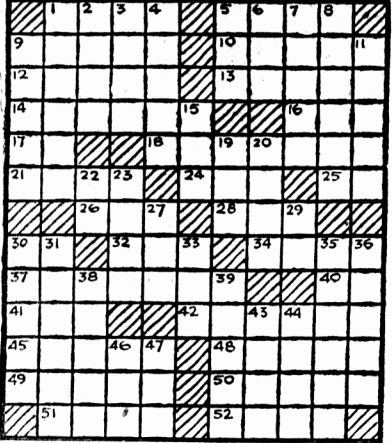

Contract Bridge

SACRIFICE BIDDING AT DUPLICATE

At match-point duplicate it is often a sound idea for a non-vulnerable pair to engage in vigorous sacrifice maneuvers against vulnerable opponents. The fact that the sacrifice contract can go down three tricks and still return a profit is of extreme importance. One thing is vital, however, and that is to avoid a 700-point penalty! Consider this case:

East dealer.  
 East-West vulnerable.  
 Match-point duplicate.

♠ 8 5 5	♥ J 4 3
♦ 7 6 4 3 2	♣ K 7
♠ Q 8 5 2	♥ J 10 4 3
♦ Q 10 4 3	♣ A K 10 9
♠ 2	♥ 7 6
♦ A K Q	♣ 8 5 5
♠ A K 7 2	♥ 8 5 5
♦ A J 8 6 6	♣ J 10 9

At seven out of the eight tables in play, East landed at five hearts — pushed there by South's bids of spades and diamonds. In these cases the East-West scores were 650 points.

At the eighth table, however, South persisted all the way to five spades, and East naturally doubled.

West laid down the king and queen of clubs, then shifted to the deuce of hearts. Declarer ruffed East's king and led a diamond to the king, then led a trump to the ace and tried to cash

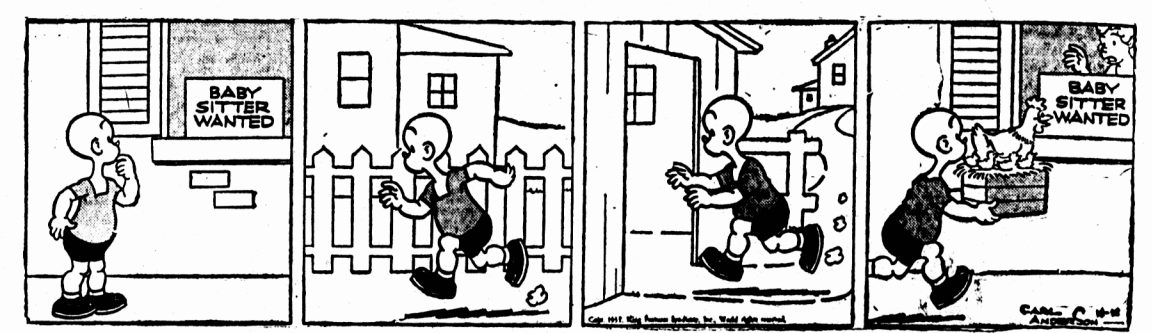

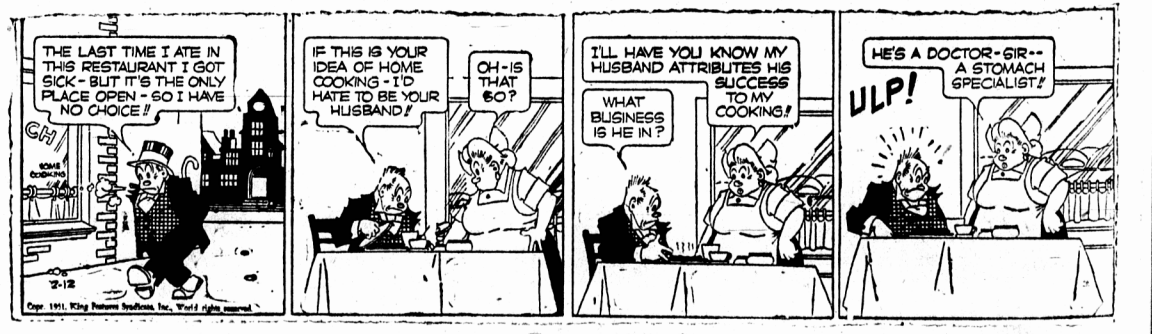
