## HONORED IN DEATH.

Handsomeness to Father Duffy and Captain Paoli.

It is about forty years since Father Duffy, a faithful priest who at one time ministered to the spiritual wants of the people of Kelly's Cross, was called to his reward. But his many good deeds have not been forgotten by the people of that flourishing settlement. A movement was some time ago instituted for a monument to mark his earthly resting place in the city of the dead. Subscriptions were invited from the parishioners and some of their friends in Charlottetown and designs were asked for. The design of Mr. E. J. Duffy, who came here from Montreal with the contractors for the new cathedral, was thought to be the most appropriate and it was adopted. Mr. Duffy lost no time in beginning work, and in a few weeks the monument will be set up in the cemetery at Kelly's Cross.

The monument is of Stevenson's Nova Scotia grey-stone. The design is that of a Celtic Cross, and it stands about twelve feet high. The face of the cross is completely carved in Celtic ornamentation, the idea being to bring out some of the figures found upon the vestments worn by the Irish priests in the early days. Entwined in the ornamentation are the words "Life Everlasting," and on the wheel of the cross which represents the four Counties of Ireland, "Gloria in Excelsis Deo." In the centre of the transept is a beautifully interlaced monogram exhibiting the letters I. H. S.

On the second base, in condensed block letters raised on the mould, is the name of the clergyman in whose honor the monument is erected, Father Duffy. On three sides of the plinth, in large raised letters, are the words "Faith, Hope and Charity," and on the fourth side "Piety." The inscription for the die has yet to be put on.

The workmanship throughout is of the best description, the lettering and fancy work being especially well done.

The memory of Captain Paoli is also to be commemorated by a monument of beautiful design and rare excellence which Mr. Duffy expects to have set up in the Roman Catholic Cemetery next week.

This monument is in the classic style, and is of New Glasgow fine grit. In height it is 11 feet 6 inches, and it measures at the base 4 feet 3 inches by 2 feet 2 inches.

It is surmounted by a cross 4 feet 3 inches by 2 feet 3 inches. On the transept is the interlaced monogram I. H. S. and on the base is an anchor and chain in bold relief. On three sides of the base, in large Gothic letters, is the surname "Paoli," on either side of which are ivy panels. The die contains the name and age of the deceased, and a scriptural quotation. The lettering has been well done, and the other ornamental work, notably the anchor and chain, has evidently been placed by a master hand. Every detail has been skillfully worked out, and the monument is one which will reflect the greatest credit on the maker as well as upon the family at whose instance it has been erected.
