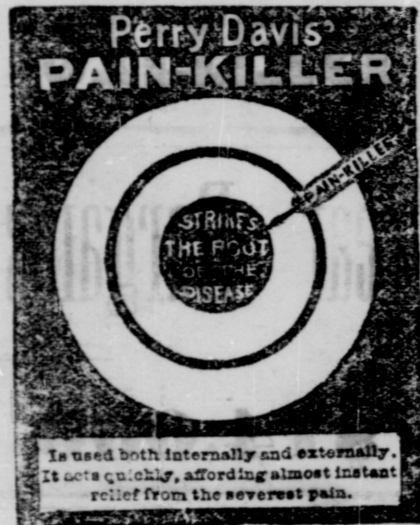

P. E. I. Hospital.

The trustees, in presenting a brief report of the receipts and expenditures of the Hospital and its general business for the past year terminating this day, are thankful to be enabled to state that although its funds are now low, yet by the good order of God's providence, the institution has sustained its good reputation during the past year. The income for the year was \$2,382.30, added to which the balance on hand at the end of last year, viz., \$153.54, makes a credit of \$2,535.84. The expenditures during the year have been \$2,541.24, leaving a balance of \$531 against the Hospital, and an expenditure over actual income of \$168.85, as will appear from the Treasurer's account herewith furnished. But the cash subscriptions for the year exceed those of the past year by \$311.04, while the church collections are \$31.73 short of the previous year. The receipts from paying patients, \$639.14, are, however, more by \$206.53 than the previous year. The number of non-paying patients were 52, and of paying patients 44, and of out-door patients 30, making in all 126. The indoor patients were, males, 55; females, 43. The discharged cured numbered 50; improved, 32; incurable, 1; died, 2; remaining, 13. The religion of the inmates were, Episcopal Church, English, 15; Presbyterian, 41; Methodist, 25; Baptists, 6; Roman Catholic, 7; Salvation Army, 4.

Previous to the resignation of her situation by the late matron, the trustees were fortunate in securing the services of the present matron, Miss Sheraton, a graduate of the City Hospital of St. John, N. B., who was very highly recommended by the medical staff of the St. John Hospital. This lady took charge on the 24th November last, and ever since her appointment she has amply verified all her testimonials and recommendations. By her suggestions, several improvements have been introduced, adding to the efficiency of the institution. Amongst other things, she has opened a class for women's instruction and training in nursing, which now numbers 18, the fees from which, already paid to the Hospital, amounts to \$90. This movement has the entire approval of the medical staff, who have long felt the want of trained nurses in this community.

Certain necessary repairs and furniture and some increase in the salaries and wages have increased last year's expenditure about \$300 over the previous year.

The assistant nurses and domestics have satisfactorily discharged their duties.

The trustees, in closing this report, feel it imperative on them again to call public attention to the fact that this year for the first time in its history the annual account shows a balance against the hospital, and the important question arises how are the funds to be procured, viz., about \$230 cash per month, to sustain the institution unless the public generally throughout the whole island contribute something to its maintenance. When it is remembered that the number of patients who are received and treated entirely free, with medicines, washing and other necessities, are always in excess of paying patients, and that this is always likely to continue, and that the institution has no endowment or government aid of any kind, and that of the sum of \$1257.37 the total received during the previous year from subscriptions, church collections and sundry societies, \$735.93 was received from the City of Charlottetown alone, the trustees can only again earnestly and respectfully invite country clergymen and members of all denominations in all parts of the island, to assist in maintaining an institution so useful and necessary in every community. The trustees feel assured that the public generally, especially in the country districts, have not given it that support and encouragement which it imperatively demands if its usefulness is to be sustained.

The medical staff are again entitled to our thanks for their attentive and valuable services rendered gratuitously during the past year.

The Largest Farm in the World.

The largest farm in the world is one in the southwest of the state of Louisiana, measuring 100 miles north and south and 25 miles east and west. The 1,500,000 acres of which it is made up were purchased seven years ago from the United States government by a syndicate of northern capitalists, by which it is now farmed. At this time it was a vast grazing ground for the cattle of the few dealers in the neighborhood, there being 30,000 head of cattle anchored upon it. This immense tract is now divided into convenient pasture stations or ranches, the fencing alone costing \$50,000. The land is best adapted to rice, sugar, corn and cotton. All the cultivating, ditching, etc., is done by steam power, a tract of about a half a mile wide being taken and an engine placed on each side. The engines are portable and work a cable attached to four plows, the area plowed in this way with the labor of only three men, being thirty acres. Harrowing, sowing, etc., are done in the same way, and there is not a single draft horse on the estate. Horses are, however, used for the herdsmen who look after the 16,000 head of cattle upon the property, which is traversed for thirty-six miles by the Southern Pacific Railway. The company has three steamboats upon the 300 miles of navigable waters which traverse its immense estate, and also possesses a shipyard, a bank and two rice mills.

How to Cool Out a Trotter.

WE MUST BE RUBBED WELL ALL OVER AND DRIED AND THEN BLANKETED.

When the horse comes in from his work rub him all over, from his ears to his tail and down to his knees, with wash as near the temperature of his body as possible. To make this wash, take one part alcohol, two parts witch hazel and three or four times as much soft water as the combined quantity of alcohol and witch hazel. Every muscle should be rubbed thoroughly. Throw a medium weight blanket over the horse now, and let him stand until you have put the bandages on. Use the same wash for the legs as for the body, but have it cold.

After putting the wash on the legs, rub them well with the palm of the hand, always rubbing down never up. Put bandages on immediately after the rubbing. Rub all his heels perfectly dry, with clean, dry rags; care should be taken in this, as cracked heels are very stubborn and often lay a horse up for the season. Throw the blanket back from his head and scrape out all the wash that remains. Most of it will have entered the pores of the body.

Cover up his shoulders and scrape the rest of the body; take a clean, dry rag and rub him all over lightly, always rubbing with the hair as much as possible; now put a light hood on him and an extra blanket over his head, and after looking after his heels again, walk him out for about five minutes, then bring him in, and should he have broken out any while walking, scrape him again lightly, after which give him another light rubbing for say four or five minutes, when he should be again walked for about ten minutes, and again taken in and rubbed slightly, after which put on lighter blankets and continue to reduce the weight as the heat leaves the body.—Exchange.

Benefits of Seasickness.

THE PHYSICAL ADVANTAGES OF THE NATURAL INTERNAL TURKISH BATH.

Hundreds of women—and men, too, for that matter—who intend going abroad this coming summer, dread the possibility of being seasick, says the Ladies' Home Journal. Every precaution ever thought of, printed or told, is borne in mind, and many women go on board ship with a quantity of so-called "remedies" enough to kill ten ordinary persons.

The simple fact is that no remedy is so little understood by the doctors as seasickness, and no matter what they may recommend to quiet the fears of intending voyagers there is no such thing as a remedy. Is there any cause for uneasiness in this? Not a particle. There is nothing in the world so productive of good results as seasickness. True, it is unpleasant, but so is any good medicine. If women would anticipate seasickness less, they would be more comfortable.

A good dose of seasickness is the best internal Turkish bath imaginable. You may feel as if you are going to die, but depend upon it you will not. As a rule two days is the limit, and then it is over, and never will you feel so well. Lemons, oranges, champagne—all these are recommended, but the best recommendation, the most practical and common sense, is to let the seasickness have its way, and then you are over with it.

You can modify any possible attack by a little care as to diet a day or two before sailing by avoiding greasy and rich foods, and this is wise. But don't go on board with the settled idea that you are going to be sick. Dismiss the thought. Keep on your feet the first day out. Walk up and down the deck continuously. By this method you get accustomed to the motion of the ship, tire yourself out, and if you are any sort of a sleeper, you will sleep soundly the first night.

Then the worst is over. But if not, and you do get sick, just accept it philosophically. Of course you will feel miserable. But let the spell run its course and it is done. And you are done for it and certainly wiser than to try to cure it by a mixture of things, which instead of remedying matters irritates the stomach and gives it a reason for a continuance of proceedings.

One of the leading medical authorities in the world says that fifteen grains of sulphate of quinine administered two hours or four hours at the most, before embarking, will completely free even sensitive subjects from the horrors of seasickness. The experiment is worth trying. In any event it will do no harm. What good it will do remains for every person to decide.

The Fisheries.

HALIFAX June 5.—The herring fishery was reported very good to-day at Perce, Que., fair at Grand River, poor at Paspébiac and scarce at all other points throughout the fishing districts.

Lobsters are very good at Esquimaux, N. S., but scarce on the shores of P. E. I. The catch for the most part is good from Port Hood, C. B., round the shore down as far as Arichat.

The cod and mackerel fisheries are reported about the same yesterday.

The Etats has surrendered to a United States ship-of-war and will be brought back to San Diego and libelled like a lazy merchantman that had neglected to pay for the captain's beer.
