LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

NEW POTATOES.—New potatoes were sold in Sydney, C. B., on Friday and Saturday last for \$1.20 a bushel.

HEARTZ'S HALL.—Rev. Mr. Emery will preach at Hertz's Hall tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock.

ST. JAMES' CHURCH.—The Rev. James Carruthers will preach at the evening service tomorrow. Mr. Carruthers was for many years pastor of St. James', and there will doubtless be a large congregation.

SUPREME COURT.

Donald Gillis vs. Martin Martin. This action was tried before the Chief Justice and a jury and occupied the attention of the court for three days. London, July 29.—The Post this morning prints a special article in which it says of the conferences between Sir William W. Whiteway, premier of Newfoundland, and Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, secretary of state for the colonies, that, excluding the French Shore question, which is in abeyance, it is believed that three important matters were discussed. First, the ratification of the Bond-Blaine convention, second, the withholding of the Imperial assent to the act to amend the election act of 1889, and, third, the question of Imperial and colonial subsidies to the Messrs Allen for carrying the mails. In regard to the first it is believed that before long the Government will ratify the convention. As to the second, it is believed that the bill will be submitted to the law officers of the Crown without delay, and will probably be sanctioned. Regarding the third, it is understood that the subsidies will be reduced to half of the amounts formerly paid.
