Yanks Intrigued By Hints Soviets Seeking U.S. Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. officials are intrigued by evidence the Soviet Union now would like the United States to provide aid in the Communist struggle with Red China.
This seems to be on the face of a report by the Russians in an aiming at with their lecture to the American press Thursday about continuing Communist Chinese charges against Soviet Communism.

Beneath the surface, however, the Russians actually appear to be trying to use their contacts with the Chinese in an effort to win concessions from the U.S. in fields of disarmament, nuclear arms for NATO or the future of Germany and Berlin.
It is an interesting twist on what U.S. policy-makers consider one of the most important situations in the world today, the Communist unswerving fight between Moscow and Peking.

The mere fact the Russians would deal with the Chinese in such a way as to suggest a greater community of interest with the U.S. than with the Chinese is an indication of how far Premier Khrushchev and his advisers think the situation has gone.

First a word about the bidding. North-South were playing what is known as the unusual notrump convention, and in a jump to two notrumps as similar to a takeout double except that it indicated unusual length in the minor suit.

It is doubtful that South should have used the convention with his actual hand—the bid would have been a disaster.

Jeey Explains Statement On Falls Project

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Premier Smallwood said here a statement made by British head Robert H. Winters Wednesday on the deferral of construction of the Hamilton Falls project was "very, very simple."
Smallwood said that the situation is this: It was believed that Hydro Quebec would buy this power from Hamilton Falls by the year 1968. If that were so, then it would be necessary to begin this very year.

He said the plan was to start this year. "Now Quebec comes along and says, 'Well, we now find that we won't need this power in 1968. We won't need it until 1969.'
If this power is needed a year later they can begin construction a year later."
He said if the power has to be available in 1968 "construction can start a year later—that is to say next year."

The broadcast said Western opinion divided with some "Western politicians" calling for "reputation of the cold war doctrine while others would like to intensify the cold war; it added.

"One thing they (the others) do not like the anti-Communist Communists with Chinese leaders is a chance to turn it to their own anti-Communist ends."
Western countries will be making a great mistake if they let themselves be taken in by such men. They will have a good opportunity to reach agreement with the Soviet Union and its friends for common peace action."
