Canadians Being Offered Valuable Mining Map Free

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadians are being offered a free copy of one of the most sought-after mining maps in the world in an effort to stir up a greater public interest in mining developments in this country.

The federal mines department said that one free copy of the 11th edition of the map—"Canada—Principal Mineral Areas—900-A"—will be sent on request to any resident of Canada.

The department has made arrangements under which persons requesting the map need only write "900-A" on a postcard along with their name and address. The charge to persons residing outside of Canada is \$5.

Cards should be sent to the department of mines and technical surveys, Ottawa.

The map was first produced in 1947. Since then requests for copies have been received from all parts of the world.

Measuring two feet, nine inches by three feet and printed in 10 colors, the map gives a

vivid picture of Canada's main mineral areas and geological divisions. It shows what is going on in mining from the sub-Arctic to the international boundary and from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

"With 900-A spread over his desk a citizen of Pakistan can learn more about Canada's mining industry in one hour than the average Canadian learns in a lifetime," the department said.

New Outlet Is Sought For Fish Oil

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's fisheries department is trying to interest oil companies in using fish oils as additives in conventional lubricants.

A meeting of the Fisheries Research Board was held here that successful experiments with cod liver oil and herring oil have been made at the Halifax technological station.

Oils are treated by blowing air through them at high temperatures. This thickens the oil and stabilizes it against decomposition during operation at high temperatures in machines.

At present the process is used to treat vegetable oils for use as additives for certain petroleum products.

Department officials said they hope a market can be created for the "blown" fish oils because the cost of preparation is less than with vegetable oils.
