**Nova Scotia Has Long Lead After Opening Day In Jr. Curling Bonspiel**

Two Nova Scotia rinks—Bridgewater and Halifax—swept through the opening day's play for the Maritime Junior Curling Championship yesterday without a loss to take a strangle-hold on the title.

In a morning round the Blue-nose rinks won both matches against rinks of the Charlottetown Club and in the evening round repeated the performance against rinks from Campbellton and Bathurst representing New Brunswick.

In the afternoon round Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick split their two matches. Play will be resumed this morning.

In opening their bid for the Atlantic Wholesaler's Trophy, the Bridgewater rink skipped by Murray Leaman disposed of the Charlottetown rink skipped by Johnny Squarebriggs 10-7. In the other encounter the Moffatt rink from Halifax experienced a bit tougher competition winning out only after an extra end against the Clifford MacDonald rink 11-10.

In the night-cap the Leaman rink fought a nip and tuck duel with the Day rink from Campbellton winning out as a result of a big four 11th end 11-10. Their opponents from Halifax meanwhile were handing the McCordle rink from Bathurst a 16-9 setback.

The lone win for both the Island and New Brunswick came in the afternoon round. The Clifford MacDonald rink won handily from the Campbellton quartet 16-8. In the other bracket the McCordle rink handed the Squarebriggs rink their second defeat 12-10.

**Murray Harbor Defeats East Royalty 8-1 In Intermediate B Opener**

Murray Harbor Royals walloped the East Royalty Royals 8-1 at the Forum last night to take a strangle hold on the King's and Queen's County Intermediate "B" Island playdowns in the first game of a home and home total game series.

Paced by fast skating Roy Macdonald the King's County hockeyists jumped into a 3-1 lead in the first period, shot four more in the second and finished the scoring off for the evening with a goal at the 16 second mark in the third period.

MacDonald scored three goals for a hat trick performance and assisted on two others. S. Hume tallied twice while G. Harris, Nicolle and Gerry Macdonald shot approximately 800, East Royalty and three hundred people from Murray Harbor and Eastern points were reported to have been in the Forum rooting for their favorites while a quieter crowd of East Royalty supporters lined the opposite side.

G. Harris shot the first goal of the night, a backhand shot from about fifteen feet out on a play with R. MacDonald at the 12:20 mark. A little over two minutes later Roy MacDonald poke-checked an East Royalty defenceman to break into the clear and backhand a high hard one past Roper.

East Royalty's only goal was a three way play of linemen Burhoe, Dockendorf and Molyneux at the 18:08 mark. Thirty six seconds later Hume broke away from centre ice to fire home the last goal of the period.

Young Nicolle, brother of Saint John Beavers' Nick Nicolle backhanded Hume's rebound for the first goal in the second. MacNeill next shot the disc through a maze of players into an open net after Roper had stopped MacDonald on a breakaway to make the score 5-1.

East Royalty were making a determined ganging attack to get back on even footing when Roy MacDonald broke away from his own blueline to score his second goal of the evening. About four minutes later Hume converted a pass from linemen Chapman and Nicolle to end the scoring in the period.

A lightning like goal by Roy MacDonald at the 16 second mark in the third session completed the scoring. At this point East Royalty came to life and played on even terms with the Bruins for the remainder of the encounter. The two penalties of the session were handed out in this session with each team getting one.

The second and last game of the series will be played in Murray Harbor Saturday night. The winners will face the Borden Nationals for the Island Intermediate "B" title.

**Ray Famechon To Get Little In Title Fight**

NEW YORK, March 14—(AP)—Ray Famechon is a confident, determined Frenchman who came to the United States with only one purpose—to win the world's featherweight championship from Willie Pep.

"Get me Pep or I'll go home," said the European featherweight king. "It's Pep or nothing."

What he got was Pep and nothing. The contract call for him to receive 10 per cent of the net gate for his title 15-rounder with Pep in Madison Square Garden Friday night. The champ from Hartford will get 40 per cent.

Rangy Ray's cut will come to about \$7,000. When income taxes and expenses are figured, the 25-year-old Frenchman probably will wind up without a franc.

But that doesn't bother the former coal miner as much as some remarks dropped by Willy Willie at Hartford, Conn., yesterday.

Asked how he planned to fight Famechon, Pep said:

"If he walks in there like they say he does, I'm going to move around him and jab. I'm going to try and stop him with face cuts."

When Famechon heard of it he gave out with Gallic equivalent of "you're kidding?"

"Solemnly assured it was so, Famechon declared "what kind of a way is that for a world champion to talk about winning; cutting other people up. Anyway it's liable to happen the other way around."

"Look, I'm going to go out there and fight every minute of every round," the Frenchman said with gestures. "I'm going out there to win that title or they'll carry me out."

The bookmakers reckon he's more likely to be "carried out" than carry home the crown. They have made the great little champion a 1-to-3 choice.

**Will Seek Agreement On Nfld. Bases**

OTTAWA, March 14—(CP)—The Canadian-American joint Permanent Defence Board will meet in Montreal March 29 and may reach agreement at that time on its final recommendations for the future administration of three U.S. military bases in Newfoundland.

The recommendations of the board go to the two governments in Ottawa and Washington for consideration and probably action. Its powers are advisory but the majority of decisions usually are carried out.

There is no certainty that the issue of the Newfoundland bases will be resolved at this particular meeting but an effort will be made to do so. It may be found necessary, however, to consider it at another meeting.

The problem of the bases arises from Canada's absorption of Newfoundland April 1 last. The U.S. took a 99-year lease on them in wartime 1940 and now holds civilian powers in those areas which the Canadian Government feels tend to violate its sovereignty.

Canada has no desire to take over the bases for military purposes. Defence Minister Claxton has said their operations would be beyond Canada's peacetime military capacity. What Canada does
