Georgetown Fire Brigade Purchases 40 Foot Ladder

GEORGETOWN — The regular monthly meeting of the Georgetown Town Council was held in the council chambers Monday night, with Mayor Howard S. MacLean presiding and Councillors Lavers, Currie, MacDonald, McConnell and Johnson in attendance.

Councillor Lavers reported for the Finance Committee. The report of the Police Committee, chaired by Councillor Johnson, was presented to the meeting by town police officer, Allison Gower. The report showed the amount of \$115 collected in fines for the month. Councillor Currie reported for the Welfare Committee and stated that she and the Town Clerk had attended a meeting held in Charlottetown on April 22nd that dealt with social assistance payments.

The report of the Fire Committee, headed by Councillor MacDonald, stated that the new 40 foot ladder was needed for the Fire Department and this was ordered to be purchased. Councillor McConnell reported for Public Property. Correspondence was read from the Commissioner of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and from the Attorney General relative to the possible future policing of the Town of Georgetown by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. This matter is being further studied and investigated.

It was also reported that a number of stop-signs had been erected. Work on the fencing of the town dump had been carried out during April, with the dump being fenced, with a chain link wire fence.

It was moved that the Town's Solicitor be contacted and that he draw up a By-Law to regulate the removal of filth and rubbish from yards.

A copy of a minute of the executive council was received, which authorizes the Royal Bank to extend credit to the town of Georgetown for one year or until such time as Debentures are issued, for an amount up to \$30,000 for the installation of a Sanitary Sewage Collection System.

Further correspondence was received from Laurie A. Coles and Associates relative to the Sewage System. A contract was recently let to Schurman Construction Limited for \$61,017 for the installation of this system, and work is expected to commence during this week. The necessary pipe will be purchased direct by the Town at an estimated cost of \$17,056.

Third reading was given to a By-Law setting the tax rate for the present year for town taxes. The assessment rate will remain the same at \$1.25 per one hundred dollars; the poll tax remains the same at \$10; bicycle tax to remain at \$1; dog tax to remain at \$5 and \$25, male and female; property poll tax to remain the same at \$2.50; the fire tax will be raised from \$8 to \$10 and the car tax to be increased by \$2.

A Sanitary or Dump Tax will be levied amounting to \$2 for each property owner or any male or female renting or occupying a house or apartment. Business establishments may if they so desire pay a \$20 annual tax, which will entitle them to a key of the dump, which will facilitate their dumping at any time. Non-resident fire tax will be \$10 and non-residents using the dump will pay a \$2 tax.

MADE NECESSARY
The new dump tax was made necessary due to the very considerable work that has been done at the dump site and the cost involved. This was made necessary by the indiscriminate dumping of rubbish by citizens. It now is planned to have the dump open on certain days.

All rate payers will be allowed a five per cent deduction on taxes paid before June 30th and a six per cent charge will be levied on taxes paid after the June 30th date. The car tax is due and payable on June 30th, or the particular vehicle, on which the tax is not paid by that date may be impounded by the policeman. The council budgeted for a revenue of \$17,627 and an expenditure of \$17,815 on ordinary expenditures.

A capital expenditure account has been set up, which includes the sewage installation project; the fire truck; the installed water valves; fire truck payment; street work and paving; survey costs; bull dozing. In this Capital Expenditure account the Council budgeted for a revenue of \$15,292 and an expenditure of \$13,790 for the year, which shows a surplus of \$1,501.

Caretaker Claims Salary

SOURIS — At a recent meeting of the Town Council here it was stated that a letter was received in reference to a letter that the town had written to one of the town employees, stating that his services as caretaker would not be required after May 21, 1966.

The letter the town received stated that the minutes of council of Feb. 8th, 1965, under which the employee was appointed, showed that it was a clear contractual obligation on the part of the town to provide employment for the employee for a period of two years from Feb. 8, 1965.

Therefore an expired period of 37 weeks and employee rate of pay was fixed by the minutes at \$55 per week. The amount owing to him by the town under his contract for services is \$2035, and the employee is now claiming this amount.

Council made no comment on this letter. The Council stated that a final warning for water users in the arrears of two months or over and there will be no further notice given. Water will be shut off May 31.

Dief Suggests TV Program From Commons Each Day

OTTAWA (CP) — Opposition Leader Diefenbaker said Tuesday he thinks at least one-half of each daily sitting of the Commons should be televised.

"I now believe that the time has come to bring Parliament to the people," he told 340 high school students.

Although he had opposed television and radio broadcasts of the Commons in the past, he said he thinks it now is necessary for Canadians to know something about the way Parliament works.

He suggested that a special Commons committee be set up to study low televising the sittings could be arranged.

"I think a half-hour broadcast
