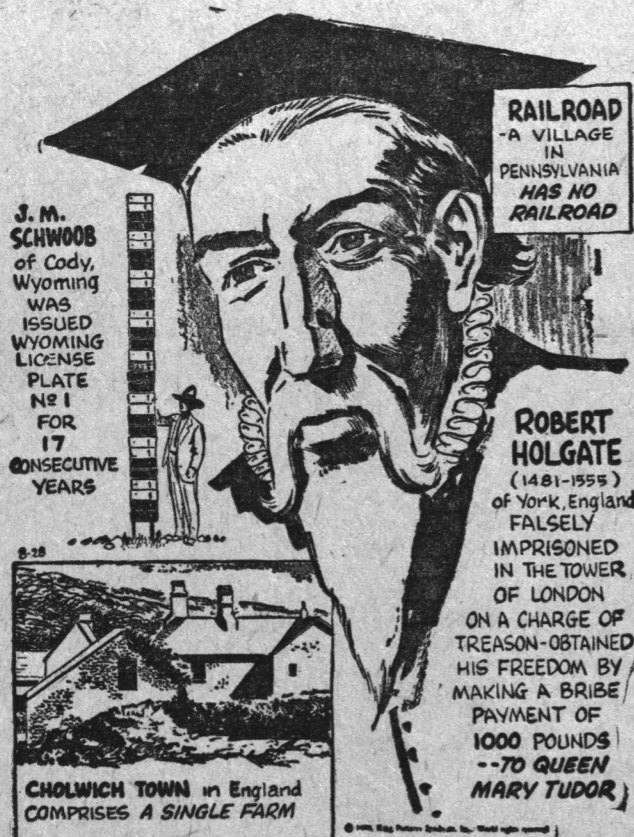

CONTRACT BRIDGE

East dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:
East 1♠ South West North
1♦ 1♥ Pass 4♥

Opening lead—two of diamonds. There are easy hands to play in bridge, and there are tough ones. The easy ones don't teach us much, but the tough ones are not only challenging and interesting but also instructive. Presented here is a defensive play we would classify as difficult. West opens a diamond and East wins with the ace. What should East play at trick two? The proper return is a club! First, let's examine the effect of the play before we consider the reason for it. East returns the two of clubs and West's ten forces the queen. If declarer draws two rounds of trumps and leads the queen of

spades, East wins with the king and returns a club. South must go down since he has to lose two spades, a diamond, and a club. But suppose East had not returned a club. Then declarer would have made the hand, losing only two spades and a diamond, since two spade tricks in dummy could be built up in time to take care of South's club losers. East sees only his own hand and dummy's. But these 26 cards are enough to indicate that only a club has any real chance of defeating the contract. East can't tell who has the ten of clubs, but he assumes the contract will make if South has it and may be defeated if West has it. What East does as defender is count declarer's tricks by looking at dummy. He assumes five hearts, two spades, and a club. This brings South to eight tricks. Since West opened the two of diamonds he cannot have more than four. Therefore declarer is credited with a minimum of three diamonds. But since South can ruff two diamonds in dummy, he has two more tricks available to bring the total to ten. East cannot afford to sit and wait. His only chance at trick two is to develop a club trick. The club plan may fail if South has the ten of only two clubs, but if this is the case, no harm will have been done.

Old Division In Quebec's Social Crediters Is Widened

MONTREAL (CP) — An old schism among Quebec's Social Credit supporters sharpened Monday in face of a move to fuse splinter groups into a single political action and education movement. The Union of Electors, strongest in recent years of some six splinter factions, denounced efforts of a "handful of election-minded men" to bring together recalcitrant Quebec "credentists." An initial attempt at picking a party leader, getting a program and viewing the party's future course is to be made next weekend at a provincial convention here. Some 70 delegates are expected to participate in the meeting, announced last week by a new organization that calls itself the Ralliement des Creditistes de la Province de Quebec—Quebec Social Credit Rally. "In a prepared statement, Director-General Louis Even of the Union of Electors said: "The matter amounts to nothing but the noisy desertion of some discontented men from the ranks of the only genuine and only strong Social Credit movement in French Canada. . . . Despite the name they have assumed, their undertaking has all the characteristics of a schism and none of a rally."

1,500,000 ballots cast but failed to get a single man elected. After the 1948 defeat the Union of Electors withdrew from the electoral field. "It concentrates on educational activities, a long Social Credit line, and fosters pressure politics to seek results from elected bodies of whatever party," said Mr. Even. He referred to the defeat of all Social Credit party candidates in the March 31 federal election and said a small group of men in Quebec is trying to revive a party that had "failed lamentably" at the polls. Spokesman for the new rally, Gilles Grogre of Quebec City, has already said the movement has not yet decided whether to place party candidates in the next provincial general elections—possibly in 1960. The party, however, will not run candidates in two provincial byelections for Oct. 15.

Plans Little Change In CBC

OTTAWA (CP)—Revenue Minister Nowlan made clear Monday night the CBC will continue to operate virtually unchanged when an independent body to regulate all broadcasting in Canada has been established. He spoke of the government's intention of "continuing, maintaining and strengthening" the CBC as he introduced in the Commons a resolution to give to an independent body the regulatory power over broadcasting currently held by the public.

The minister spoke for scarcely five minutes at this preliminary owned CBC. STAGE OF THE MEASURE. Mr. Nowlan said the government stage of the measure. Mr. Nowlan said the government supports the belief that the CBC is an important instrument in promoting a stronger Canadianism. Mr. Nowlan, who reports to Parliament for the CBC, said establishment of the new regulatory body has created "certain administrative difficulties." He did not elaborate on this point.
