SIR RICHARD'S MISTAKE.

SIR RICHARD CARTWRIGHT has been acting Rip Van Winkle. All the time the Conservatives were in office he was asleep to the great progress and prosperity of the country and crying out, as one afflicted with the nightmare, that "blue ruin" prevailed. But, when the Liberals gained office, Sir Richard woke up. Now, from his office windows, with his office spectacles on, he looks out upon a fair prospect and declares that Canada has prospered more in the last three years than she did in the previous thirty. Sir Richard is mistaken. Canada has been prosperous and progressive ever since the National Policy was put into operation. Even throughout the period of world-wide depression and ruin which began in 1893 and ended in 1896, when the banks, and factories, and commercial organizations of United States, Australia and other countries were tumbling about the ears of their owners, the people of Canada held their own under the National Policy, and continued to prosper. Canada prospers yet; for the National Policy has been maintained. There is nothing surprising about the prosperity. It is just what was predicted by Sir John Macdonald and Sir Charles Tupper; just what was expected by every Conservative, as a result of the continuance of the National Policy. The Conservatives planted; the Liberals, false as they have proved to be to their principles and false to their promises, are eating the fruit. They are, moreover, fulfilling to the letter the declaration of the Psalmist that one man gathereth and another scattereth. With a swelling revenue, (the result of the maintenance of the protective taxes) and the return of activity in trade, they ought to be recuperating the finances of the country and paying off the old debts which were necessarily incurred in the construction of our matchless canal system and our great transcontinental railway system extending from Sydney to Vancouver. Instead of that, they are launching out into new expenditures—many of them of the most questionable character. Besides this, they have raised the ordinary expenditures of the Government from \$37,000,000 a year—a sum which they denounced as monstrous—to close upon \$45,000,000; their capital expenditures swell this amount to \$60,000,000; and the total liabilities to which they committed the country in the last session of Parliament foot up to all but \$70,000,000. The result is that, while the public debt ought to be reduced it is largely increased, and that so far as the financial condition of the country is concerned the prosperity of Canada counts for nothing. In a period of unexampled prosperity our finances are actually going from bad to worse. But Sir Richard says, "it is all right, because Canada has prospered more in the past three years than in the previous thirty,—therefore the people can bear it."

Sir Richard tried to make out that the Liberals are not, after all, expending much more than their predecessors; and to this end he submitted his statement of Mr. Foister's estimates for 1897 as follows:

Our readers will not fail to note the item of \$2,500,000 for railway extension in P. E. Island and to draw the conclusion

that if Sir Richard's statement is correct, we should have had all the branch railways we desire long ere this. In point of fact Sir Richard has exaggerated and distorted the figures and his statement is altogether misleading. For instance the whole of the \$2,500,000 which the Conservatives intended to have expended in railway construction in this Province would not have been paid out in 1897,—if the Conservatives had remained in power. Such mixing and muddling of an opponent's estimates are unworthy a man of Sir Richard Cartwright's prominence even though he is in a tight place.

NOVA SCOTIA EXHIBITION

Arrangements for Providing Accommodation for Visitors.

The Lodging Bureau in connection with the Provincial Exhibition is now open and for the present will be located at Room 13, Roy Building, 75 Barrington St. It is under direction of Alderman Butler, who will have associated with him an efficient staff each of which will have personal knowledge of the accommodation offered by those who intend to keep lodgers or boarders during exhibition week. The reports from advertising agents and others go to show that the number of visitors this year will exceed 1897 by fully 40 per cent. It is therefore highly desirable that intending visitors should place themselves in communication with the bureau at once and on arrival in the city go to the office, and be located in the place assigned them, which, of course they are not bound to take if found unsuitable.

A New Contrivance.

BERLIN, August 27.—The water tandem is the latest application of the bicycle here. The cyclists are seated on a middle platform, which is supported by a couple of cigar-shaped boats. The contrivance holds six persons, including the two wheelmen. It goes either backward or forward, and the steering is perfect.

It is rumored in banking circles that Mr. E. L. Pease, general manager of the Merchants' Bank of Halifax at Montreal, has been offered the position of manager of the new American Bank, which it is proposed to establish in London, with a capital of many millions of dollars.

Under the peace maintained by British rule, the population of India has increased by 70,000,000 in thirty years. India which was affected with famine and plague during the past two or three years, is this year so prosperous it has a large surplus.

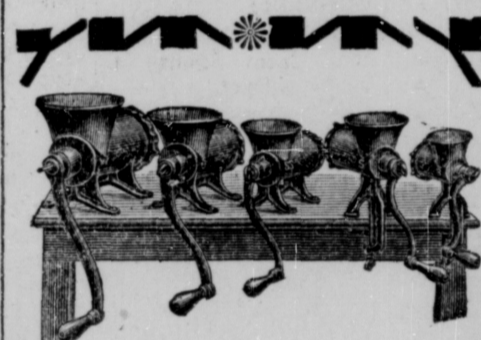
