## Film Production Endangered

TORONTO (CP)—The Telegram says radio-active fall out blown 2,100 miles from the atomic test site in Nevada has endangered production of film at the suburban Mount Denis plant of Canadian Kodak Company.

The newspaper says the plant was warned during the week-end by the Eastman Kodak Company in Rochester, N. Y., and that precautionary steps against the radiation now have been put into force in the Canadian plant.

All employees were being ordered to wipe their feet on special rubber mats before entering any of the eight plant buildings. No windows may be opened anywhere in the plant.

The paper adds production of x-ray film is most seriously affected since it is most sensitive to radiation, but an official of the company termed the measures "a routine check," enforced after every atomic test blast.

NEW YORK, (AP)—Even if your child has had polio, he should be inoculated with the Salk vaccine, a spokesman for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis said Wednesday.

Assuming a child has had one type of polio, and now is immune to that type, an inoculation will guard him against contracting either or both of the other two types.

There have been a number of cases in which a person has had polio more than once.
