THE steamer "Princess of Wales" went to Orwell this morning to tow Mr. Quirk's ship "Midas" out of the ice.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, Artemas Murphy was fined \$20 and costs, for selling liquor at forbidden hours.

THREE hundred and ninety-two cattle and seven hundred and fourteen sheep were shipped to England from Montreal last week.

REV. DR. McDONALD delivered a lecture on Temperance to a good audience in St. James Hall, Georgetown, on the 18th inst.

A MONSTER PIG.—Murdoch McKinnon, Esq., has at present on his farm an enormous pig, weighing over seven hundred pounds.

THE "Northern Light" will commence running between Pictou and Georgetown as soon as the Steam Navigation Co. steamer's discontinues.

PRODUCE.—Oats are coming in to-day quite rapidly, and are selling for 42 cents. Pork is very active, at from 5 to 6 1/2 cents. 50 cents is asked for hay.

IN publishing the list of subscribers to the Stellarton Relief Fund, yesterday, the name of Mr. R. F. DeBlois was omitted, as collector, in conjunction with B. Wilson Higgs.

MR. W. ROSS, of Rocky Point, sold to Horace Haszard this morning, seven carcasses of pork, weighing, in the aggregate, 2,703 lbs.—an average of nearly 400 lbs.—Creditable.

THE barque "Celano," 681 tons, owned by R. F. Quirk, cleared for Havre yesterday, with a cargo consisting of 54,801 bushels of oats and 733 pieces deals and ends, shipped by the owner.

THE Halifax *New Era* says the receipts of potatoes, oats and turnips, from P. E. Island, are very large, amounting to over 28,000 bushels potatoes, 18,000 bushels turnips, and 3,500 bushels oats, last week.

THE "St. Lawrence" left for Shediac this morning, but was obliged to return on account of the stormy weather in the Straits. This is to be regretted, as a very large quantity of freight for the Island is now lying at Point du Cheuc.

A GREAT many complaints were made last night, regarding the tardiness of the Post Office clerks in distributing the mails, which arrived per *Princess of Wales*. More punctuality is required of the P. O. officials in future.

WE regret to learn that the barns of Mr. Lauchlan McKenzie, Long Creek, together with their contents, were burned to the ground on Thursday evening, the 25th inst. The origin of the fire is unknown. At this season such a loss is most grievous. We sympathize with Mr. McKenzie.

A CANADIAN ABROAD.—The Demerara *Argosy* says: Mr. John George Daly, the newly appointed Immigration Agent General, is a son of the late Sir Dominick Daly, who was, during his official career, Secretary to the Government of Canada, Lieutenant Governor of Tobago, of Prince Edward Island, and Governor of South Australia. Mr. Daly is a Canadian by birth, and a member of the Canadian Bar. He takes up his appointment on the 1st of January.

**Cure for Diphtheria.**

A Hamilton (South Australian) paper publishes details of the "Greathead" cure for Diphtheria. The disease is declared by Mr. Greathead to be of hydrated growth, and that the germs of it floating about in certain impure atmospheres were inhaled by human beings. For a grown person, four drops of sulphuric acid diluted in three quarters of a tumbler of water; with a smaller dose for children. The effect of this treatment was instantaneous, the acids at once destroying the parasites, and the patient coughing up the obstruction. The papers have teemed with accounts of sufferers who have recovered in a few minutes by adopting the "Greathead Treatment." Children, almost previously in a dying state, were declared to be playing about within ten minutes, and at a computation some forty or fifty of these sudden recoveries have been placed on record with full particulars.
