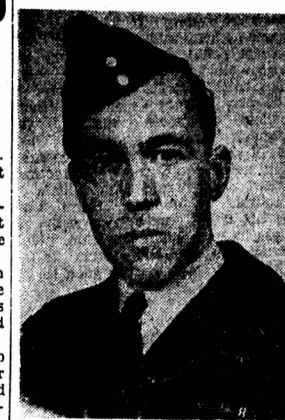

HALIFAX, Nov. 7 (CP) -- Official forecasts issued tonight by the Dominion Public Weather Office here and valid until midnight Thursday.

It was raining in the Maritime Provinces tonight while snow and ice pellets were falling in Eastern Quebec. A storm centred in New England, moving northeastward also caused strong winds over the district.

Extremely mild air is flowing into the Maritimes. Colder air is approaching from Central Canada and the United States. The colder air is expected to move across the district tomorrow afternoon and evening, preceded by showers and followed by clearing.
