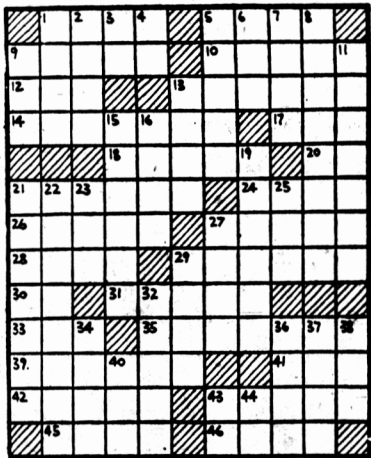

South's queen lost to the king, and West lost no time in continuing the trump leads which declarer's early play had made possible — West cashed the diamond king and led another round. Now South led a heart to the ace and returned a heart. West won and took out dummy's last diamond, the queen. If South had unblocked that diamond queen he could have saved one trick, anyway, by now being in his own hand and able to lead another heart, but locked in dummy, he was helpless, and the outcome was a four-trick, 700-point penalty.

West's doubt about his own four-diamond double was supported by the fact that South, playing correctly, could have held his loss to two tricks! It was suicidal for South to "open up" the trump suit.

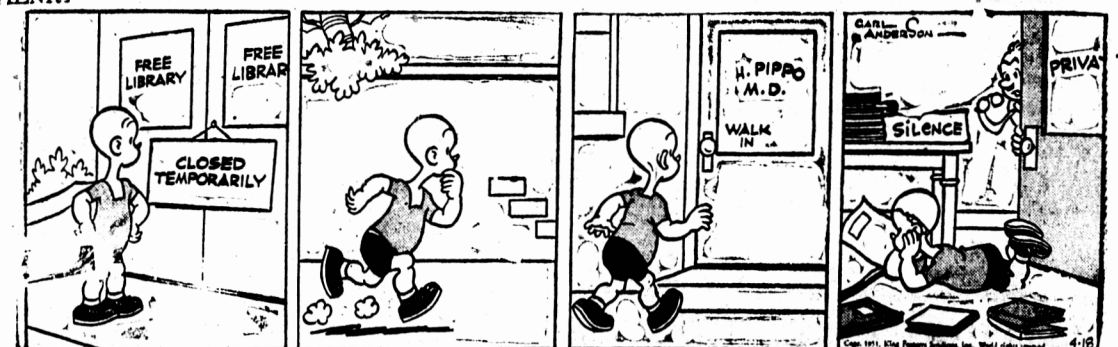
