Premier Jones To Open Provincial Plowing Match

The 11th annual Provincial Plowing Match will be officially opened at 2 p.m. at Dundas today by Premier J. Walter Jones. A two day attraction, the match has drawn a large entry list for all plowing events and horse classes, and granted fine weather, the record attendance of last year is hoped to be exceeded by a good margin.

In addition to the various outdoor events, a new building has been erected to house an excellent exhibition of handicrafts, homecraft, cooking, and a flower exhibition, which will greatly add to the appeal of the match.

The King's County Ayrshire Breeders are also holding their annual Field Day in conjunction with the match on Thursday, under the direction of the P. E. Island Ayrshire Breeders Association and in co-operation with the Canadian Ayrshire Breeders Association.

Judges for the plowing events are Willie Baird, Nappan, N.S., D. C. Schurman, assistant to the Superintendent, Field Husbandry and Forage Crops at the Experimental Farm, and Norman Black, Supervisor of Illustration Stations.

William Reid, Middleton, will be the judge of the horse classes. Judges for the women's handicraft exhibits will be Miss Mary Robin and Mrs. Maylea Manning.

The activities will commence at ten o'clock this morning and an innovation this year is that the 1st and 2nd place winners since the annual match was inaugurated, will be barred from the regular tractor classes, but will compete with the 1st and 2nd place winners of this year and the winners in the Queen's County Plowing Match of last week, in the Esso Special Class, scheduled for Thursday.

Prizes totalling \$300 are being offered at the match which is under the supervision of Mr. L. S. Hunter, President, J. G. Campbell, Vice-President, and directors John MacLeod, Louis Fitzpatrick, W. B. Creed, Albert Aitken and F. W. Clay.
