### Issue Warning On Monaco Wedding

NEW YORK (AP) — Merchandisers were given a stern warning Thursday not to plan to capitalize on the wedding of film actress Grace Kelly and Prince Rainier III of Monaco next month.

An advertisement in Women's Wear Daily, retailing organ, read:

"Any use of the name of Grace Kelly, Prince Rainier III, or their seals, or in any manner, either directly or indirectly for commercial purposes, or to further the sale of merchandise or items of any kind, without the prior authority of the undersigned, is prohibited, and any violation thereof shall be vigorously prosecuted."

It was signed by a lawyer for the Kelly family.

The forthcoming, highly publicized wedding has stirred the imagination of manufacturers eager to cash in on the event.

One idea was to have dolls manufactured in Italy dressed in copies of the couple's wedding clothes. Another was to copy the wedding clothes for people who want to look just like the couple. Still another was to manufacture handkerchiefs bearing the royal seal of Monaco.

Films of the wedding are going to be sponsored on television by a brassiere manufacturer and a cosmetics firm.

### Expect Plante Montreal's Next Police Boss

MONTREAL (CP) — A lot of people are willing to bet that (Pacific) Plante will be Montreal's next police boss soon. Ask any bookie.

A man who never pounded a beat or wore a uniform, Plante's chance comes with the resignation of T. G. (Tommy) Leggett, 59, retiring May 28 after 33 years on the force.

But as usual controversy swirled Wednesday around the head of Plante, dapper 48-year-old vice-buster. Politically, the issue is dynamic.

The post of chief of Montreal's 2,400-man force has been clouded since police Director J. Albert Langlois went on leave of absence without pay following the election of Mayor Jean Drapeau on a reform platform Oct. 25, 1954.

Since then, Leggett has been in charge as acting director, helped by Plante and Alfred Belanger as assistant directors. Belanger, 69, also has announced his resignation, apparently putting himself out of the running for promotion.

This leaves Plante—famous for his part in smashing vice operations and gambling here—as heir-apparent and Leggett recommended him for the post. Plante told reporters he would accept if it is offered.

### CCF Leader Sees Threat To Canadian Unity

OTTAWA (CP) — CCF leader Coldwell said Wednesday that the chronic difference in per capita personal income among the Canadian regions threatens Canadian unity.

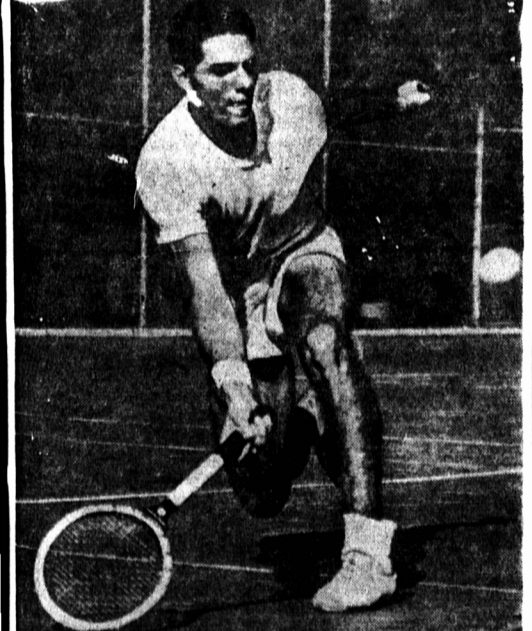
He said he is disturbed because he believes the federal government's new tax proposals to the provinces will not help achieve equal opportunity for all Canadians.

In an address to the Canadian Club of Ottawa, the CCF leader said the difference in per capita personal income in 1954 ranged from a high of \$1,470 in Ontario to a low of \$640 in Newfoundland, with New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island substantially below personal incomes in Ontario and the other provinces.

Mr. Coldwell said Canada's regional problems of today stem in large measure from the concentration of industry and finance in Quebec and Ontario. At the time of Confederation, Maritime manufacturing was diversified and, on the whole, prosperous. But with the opening of the West, the whole centre of gravity of the Canadian economy moved westward and the Maritimes found themselves on the far extremes of an unnatural tariff-national economy. Unfair national tariff and transportation policies had continued relatively unchanged.

## Players Accept Club Owners Salary, TV Contract Terms

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — The major league player representatives accepted the club owners' decision on minimum salary and a new World Series TV contract Wednesday and they also asked a workman's compensation coverage by all 16 clubs.

The players also voted to retain J. Norman Lewis of New York, as their attorney for another year at a salary estimated at \$15,000.

Lewis, who left the meeting early to catch a plane for New York, acted as spokesman for the players.

"The players came to conclusions on three major points," said Lewis. "On Feb. 4 the owners proposed two three-man committees to review the salary structures in the majors and report their findings to the player representatives in their own leagues.

"The players accepted the idea in principle but they asked a joint meeting of all 16 player representatives with the six members of the two committees.

The players had asked for a raise in minimum salary from \$6,000 to \$7,200 but had been turned down twice. The owners, in turn, named a committee "to review the present league salary structures, to ascertain if the present minimum and present unlimited maximum standards are equitable."

## Steals Car Hard Way, Gets Caught

BIRMINGHAM, England (AP) — Delena K. Adams, 36, was sentenced to six months in jail for stealing a car the hard way—piece by piece over a period of two years.

The prosecutor said Adams, an employee of a Birmingham automobile plant, intercepted spare part shipments intended for export and hoarded them up in his barn. He was just putting the finishing touches on his assembled car—a 100-mile-a-hour sports type—when the police caught up with him.

TORONTO (CP)—A nine-year-old girl hockey defenceman has jolted her way into an all-star berth in the Little Toronto Hockey League. Red-faced league officials made the discovery only Wednesday night.

For three months, Abigail Golda Hoffman has played for a Toronto boy's hockey team without her teammates knowing "Ab" or "Abi" was really a girl.

Abi's sparkling defensive play for St. Catharines Teepees of the Little THL's Junior A series led to her choice for the all-star team out of 400 eligible boys.

## Gov't Urged To Relax Hold On Uranium

OTTAWA (CP) — The government was urged Thursday to relax its hold on the uranium industry so that it could play a vital role in providing electrical power for the Western world.

Gilbert LaBine, president of Gunmar Mines Limited, said the sooner federal restrictions are lifted, the more rapid will be the transition of the industry from dependence on the military to the provision of commercial power.

"We should be working now towards the freedom from government control within the limits of security on the sale of uranium in an open market so that a world price may be established," he told the Gordon economic commission.

**RIGHT TO EXPORT**  
"The first logical step is the right to an export permit for the sale of uranium to licensed purchasers throughout the Western world."

One of the great mining figures of the northland, Mr. LaBine became known for developing big radium and uranium deposits years ago.

His discovery of pitchblende in 1930 on the shore of Great Bear lake broke the monopoly of the Belgian Congo on radium.

## Protest H-Bomb Tests

TOKYO (Reuters)—Bitter protests were voiced in Japan Saturday against the United States government's announcement on Thursday that it will carry out a new hydrogen bomb test this spring in the Pacific. Japanese newspapers said there was a "bitter and indignant" reaction in the port of Yaku, where a fishing boat doused with radio-active ash put in after tests in 1954.
