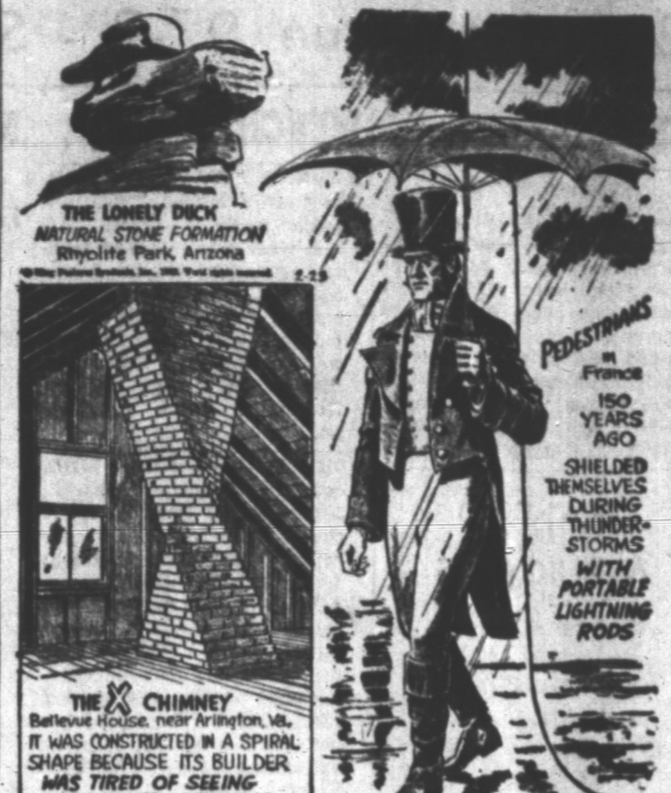


Study Of Bi-Culturalism Urged By New Democrats

MONTREAL (CP) — The New Democratic Party's federal and Quebec executive has proposed immediate establishment of a federal-provincial commission on Canadian federalism and bi-culturalism.
T. C. Douglas, party leader, and Romeo Mathieu, president of the provisional council of the NDP in Quebec, said in a joint statement that almost 100 years after Confederation federal-provincial and French-English relations continue to be "seriously unsettled and unsatisfactory."
This situation should not be allowed to drift until it got out of hand, the statement said.
"We believe that there is urgent need for a thorough study of our experience of Canadian federalism and for a careful re-thinking of the relations between the two nations which together make up the basic partnership in Confederation."
The proposed commission should hold public hearings throughout Canada and invite representatives of every section of the Canadian community to present views and make recommendations.
The statement said it is "little short of disastrous for the Diefenbaker government to attempt to force through a formula for constitutional amendment which has been worked out in secret sessions, before public opinion has been either informed or expressed."

CONTRACT BRIDGE

QUIZ

Partner bids One Club, next player passes, neither side vulnerable. What would you now bid with each of the following four hands?
1. ♠KJ73 ♥QJ85 ♦Q42 ♣63
2. ♠AQ3 ♥AJ8 ♦KJ94 ♣Q72
3. ♠AQ84 ♥AJ98 ♦AK876 ♣5
4. ♠6 ♥J9742 ♦AKQ10 ♣K5
1. One heart. When partner opens with one of a suit, you are required to respond if you have as many as 6 points in high cards. You don't expect partner to make a game when you have 6 points, because he will seldom have hands counting 20 points or more, but you keep the bidding alive in order to cover that possibility.
When you have 9 points, the chance of making game is increased, but it's still nothing to write home about. With a 9-point hand you should plan to bid once and then drop out of the picture—unless partner, on his rebid, indicates game-going prospects, as, for example, by making a jump rebid. In that case, you would bid again.
Since, at the moment, you plan to bid only once, it is better to respond with a heart than a spade. This keeps the bidding low and permits a spade or heart fit to be found, whereas if you responded with a spade, a conceivable heart fit might never be found.
It would be improper to respond directly with one notrump. The search for a major suit fit comes first.
2. Three notrump. This response shows 16 or 17 points, not a trump distribution, and strength in all suits. A two-notrump response would represent 13 to 15 points. Naturally, the three notrump response urges partner to continue towards a slam if he has more than a minimum bid.
3. One diamond. This is an enormous hand to have opposite an opening bid, but its value is greatly impaired because partner opened in the suit of which we are void. If partner had opened with a spade, a heart or a diamond, nothing short of an earthquake would keep us from eventually bidding a small or grand slam, but with the club bid we have to draw in our horns and take things easy until a suit fit is discovered.
A modest response of one diamond (not two diamonds) is all that is necessary at the moment. Of course, we respond in the longest suit first, so that if and when we bid spades or hearts later, partner will know they are four-card suits.
4. One heart. A response of one diamond would be incorrect. Suits are bid according to length and not high-card strength. The aim is to find the suit in which the partners together have the greatest length. High-card content is of secondary importance.
