LATEST NEWS FROM CHINA

British Forces Held At Shanghai

PUBLIC OPINION SAYS WITHDRAWAL WOULD BE DEPLORABLE.

Stated That Pekin Government Is Preparing to Treat.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

LONDON, August 16.—The Times has the following despatch from Shanghai, dated Tuesday:

The Viceroy has withdrawn his opposition to the landing of the British troops on condition that this does not entail the presence of other forces. But instructions have been received from the British Government that the disembarkation is to await further orders.

The fact is generally known that Great Britain is hesitating.

The public, official and unofficial, is unmistakably of the opinion that the withdrawal, at this stage, would be deplorable, and would produce the worst results.

CHINESE PREPARED TO TREAT.

WASHINGTON, August 16.—The statement is made on reliable authority that the Pekin Government would designate some high officials to meet commanders of the allied forces arrived at Tung Chow, and agree with them on some measure for the safe conduct of the members of the foreign legation.

Information to this effect has been received here.

BRITISH ARMY ORDER.

MONTREAL, August 14.—Le Soleil announces that 20,000 pairs of stockings, 20,000 pairs of shoes and 20,000 portable houses are being made in Quebec and Levis for the use of the British army in China. Le Soleil says, in fact, that the minister of militia has received a \$1,000,000 order from the Imperial authorities, not to say anything about the millions spent in Canada on South African accounts. There is no denial, concludes Mr. Pacaud's paper, that England has given more than evidence of her gratitude to Canada for having assisted her in South Africa.

—A London despatch to the New York Sun credits the British Cabinet Committee on National Defence with the preparation of plans to bring Canada's military equipment more into harmony with the Imperial system. What will Mr. Tarte say to this?

FIRE AT SEA.

Heroic Struggle with the Flames.

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—The White Star liner Cymric, which came up to her dock in this city at an early hour today and landed her 373 passengers, had a terrible experience while crossing the Atlantic. At noon on Sunday, August 5, when the big vessel was 19 hours out from Queens-town, fire was discovered in the cargo in the forward hold, and it raged until midnight on Monday, when it was gotten under control.

The loss on the cargo was so heavy that Agent John Lee, of the White Star line, notified the consignees of the cargo that they would be expected to pay their pro-rata share of the loss.

Captain H. St. G. Lindsay, of the Cymric, to-night told the experience of the men on the vessel in quelling the fire. In addition to the ordinary danger of such work, the fire could not be located, and deadly chlorine gas, which poured out of the hatches, made it impossible for the men to remain long at work. The officers of the vessel headed the men, and man after man was lifted unconscious from the hold. The captain was carried out four times, and once it appeared as though breathing had stopped. In the hold were hogheads of bleaching powder and soda ash. The heat and fire caused the chlorine gas to generate, and this poured out at a terrific rate.

Great Britain, Germany and the States.

COLOGNE, Aug. 14.—The Gazette, in an editorial yesterday inveighs sharply against those politicians who are forever trying to sow discord between Germany, Great Britain, and the United States. It says: "After Mr Broderick's declaration in the House of Commons that England would not abandon her leading position in China, it deserves all the more attention that England has since waived her claim."

The approval of Great Britain and the United States of Gen. Von Waldersee's appointment ought to be a lesson to the misguided who regard friction between the three powers as the summit of diplomatic ambition." The Gazette rebuts the suspicions that Germany is drifting into a dangerous policy, the outcome of which cannot be foreseen. It argues that the contrary is the case. Germany, it says, will henceforth necessarily exercise particular care and sound judgment in order to justify the confidence of the powers, adopting a line of policy which will surely merit their approval.

One Woman's Testimony.

MONTREAL, Aug. 14.—Miss Margaret King, daughter of James King, of this city, has just returned from China, where she has been engaged in missionary work. Miss King was advised by the other missionaries at the station at which she was employed to leave in view of the troubles that were threatening to arise, but she states that, so far as she herself is concerned, she experienced nothing but the kindest treatment from the Chinese. She says that several other missionary workers in China came over by the same steamer to Vancouver, but they have not yet reached Montreal. None of them experienced any difficulty in leaving China or received ill-treatment while there.

Japanese View.

TOKIO, Aug. 14.—The hoisting of the Russian flag over New Chwang, after its capture, and General Alexieff's announcement of the establishment of a provisional Russian administration there, is regarded as the beginning of annexation of Chinese territory and as the setting of an example that is likely to be imitated by the other powers in other parts of China. The view already prevails in certain quarters here that the landing of British troops at Shanghai is a justifiable offset to the action of the Russians.

The Russians Report.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 14.—The Minister of War has issued the official report of Gen. Linovich on the battles of Pitsang and Yangtsun. It adds nothing to the facts already known, except brief details of the Russian's share in the fighting, and a statement that thirteen guns and the entire Chinese camp were captured at Pitsang. The Chinese lost heavily in both actions.

LATEST NEWS FROM SOUTH AFRICA

Colonel Hoar Still Holding Out

HAS SUFFERED SIXTY-SEVEN CASUALTIES.

Lord Roberts Hopes that Hamilton Will Effect Rescue.

CAPE TOWN, August 16.—A messenger from Colonel Hoar, commanding the British garrison at Eland's River, who left there on Tuesday reported that the garrison was still holding out when he left, although Hoar had sustained sixty seven casualties.

THE DESPATCHES FROM LORD ROBERTS.

LONDON, August 16.—The War Office has despatches from Lord Roberts announcing that Colonel Hoar was holding out at Eland's River last Friday.

Lord Roberts considers that Hamilton's cavalry must now be within forty miles of Eland's River.

THE AMEER ACTIVE.

LONDON, Aug 14.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Lahore, India, says that the Ameer of Afghanistan is mobilizing his artillery and infantry, and is reported to be contemplating an advance on the Russian frontier, after proclaiming a "Holy War." It is added that the news is not fully credited at Lahore, though, it is explained, the Ameer's behavior has been causing uneasiness in official circles.

Missionaries Massacred.

BERLIN, August 14.—The Catholic paper Germania says it learns that altogether ten out of fifty missionaries in the vicariate of southwest P. Chi Li have been murdered and that 3,000 converts have suffered the same fate.

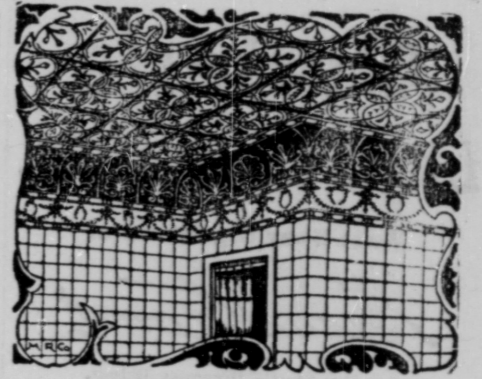
