

National Organizer For Liberals Will Remain At Post For Present

OTTAWA (CP)—National Liberal organizer Keith Davy has agreed to remain in his post "for the time being" and not follow into the steps of Finance Minister Gordon who resigned his cabinet post over the Nov. 8 election.

The announcement on Mr. Davy remaining was made Friday night by Prime Minister Pearson, who almost 24 hours earlier had announced the resignation of Mr. Gordon, the Liberal party's national campaign chairman.

Mr. Pearson said in a statement that on Friday morning Mr. Davy reminded him of a fine election conversation in which the Liberal organizer said he wanted to leave his job after the campaign, regardless of the result.

"I restated to him my gratitude for his service to the party and to me as leader, and suggested he continue in his post for the time being," Mr. Pearson said. "I am glad to say he has agreed to this."

The prime minister said that in the pre-election conversation he told Mr. Davy of his "deep appreciation" for the energy and ability that the 39-year-old head of party organization had shown in his 4½ years in the office.

Mr. Davy and Mr. Gordon were the principal advocates of a fall election, assuring the prime minister that in their opinion he was sure to win a Commons majority.

But Mr. Davy had made no secret of his desire for many months to leave party headquarters and return to his Toronto business connections as soon as the election was over.

The announcement of his decision to remain for the time being came with about as much surprise Friday night as Mr. Gordon's resignation Thursday night.

The latter said he quit simply on the principle that events proved he had given bad advice in urging the fall election.

Mr. Gordon told reporters Friday he believed the advice he had given the prime minister was right but it turned out to be wrong. And he would give the same advice again if he had to do it all over again.

Before dissolving Parliament for the election, the government faced the day-to-day threat of Commons defeat on any issue. Now, though it hasn't a majority, the government has confidence that Parliament won't lightly upset it and force yet another trip to the polls.

Reporters questioned Mr. Gordon closely on why he gave up his important finance ministry when the bad advice he gave the prime minister was not related to the portfolio itself. He denied making a scapegoat of himself or trying to take the heat off Mr. Pearson. But political observers saw Mr. Gordon's departure as giving Mr. Pearson much-welcomed room without which to shuffle his cabinet. Trade Minister Sharp is acting finance minister. The Russian Lion Called Among All Time Strongmen

By GRANVILLE J. WATTS LONDON (AP)—They called him the Russian Lion, and he was one of the strongest men the world has seen.

George Hackenschmidt, former world wrestling champion and record-holding weightlifter, was already legend at the turn of the century.

He beat the Terrible Greek and the Terrible Turk in the days when wrestling drew huge crowds. In about 3,000 bouts between 1888 and 1908 Hackenschmidt was not once forced to submit.

His feats of strength were stupendous. He once carried his local milkman's horse around on his shoulders for a joke. On another occasion he picked up five men simultaneously and carried them above his head.

NOW A LIVING LEGEND

Today the Russian-born Hackenschmidt, now 68 and a living legend, muses over the past in a modest home at Norwood, seven miles from the centre of London.

"My strength was a natural gift.

"When I was a little boy at school I found I was able to throw the other boys easily."

Hackenschmidt arrived in Britain in 1908 and twice met and beat Antonio Pieri, the Terrible Greek. Piqued by his defeats, Pieri toured the world to find someone who could beat Hackenschmidt.

He came up with Ahmed Medrall, the Terrible Turk, a 234-pound giant.

"I trained for the fight at a pub in Shepherd's Bush," Hackenschmidt recalls. "The Terrible Turk was very strong, but it was his weight that bothered me. I was 28 pounds lighter and I thought if he sat on me I'd never get him off."

USED CEMENT

"So I trained for the fight by having them put sacks of cement on my back as I lay on the floor. I wanted to get used to the pressure. They told me the cement weighed about 900 pounds altogether."

"When we fought I found the Turk had very long arms. He got me in a bear hug and

pulling me towards him. I didn't think any human being could

Urged Election

He had urged Mr. Pearson to call the election in October last year, and again last June. Because of important financial, taxation, and federal-provincial legislation needed from Parliament, it was important to have a government with strong majority, he said.

Voters in the Nov. 8 election: 129 Liberals, 90 Progressive Conservatives, 21 New Democrats, nine Creditists, five social Crediters, one Independent Conservative, and one independent who has voted Prime Minister Pearson he will vote with the Liberals. At least 133 are needed for a bare majority in the 265-seat House.

Leaving office, Mr. Gordon said he was sure his general policies will be pursued. Specifically, there would be no change in the 11-per-cent sales tax he imposed on building materials and production machinery—a tax heavily criticized by the opposition and by some Liberals.

Mr. Gordon said his policies stemmed from the national rally of the Liberal party which he organized here in January, 1961. They had sparked the economy and never again would a government be able to say it could not cure unemployment.

Mr. Gordon was asked whether any members of his "team" in Ottawa—who include Mr. Davy—intend to retire after the election.

WILL PUSH CDC

As a private MP, sitting in the House for Toronto-Davenport, Mr. Gordon will continue to press for creation of the Canada Development Corp. to sell shares to the public in government and non-government enterprises.

He intends now to take an extended holiday in Ireland.

And despite the electorate's rebuff of the Liberal call for a clean-cut majority, Mr. Gordon said the government emerged from the election stronger than it was when the election was called.
