THE WORK AT WILTSHIRE

Formal Opening of the New Road-- Its Cost, and Other Information.

The work of straightening the celebrated loop at North Wiltshire has been completed, and the formal opening took place this forenoon. The first train to pass over the new road was in charge of Conductor John Macdonald, and driver Love was in the cab. Superintendent Sharp's private car was attached to the train, and in it, as guests of Mr Sharp, were Mayor Warburton, Hon B Rogers, L E Prowse, M L A, A B Mackenzie, C L A, F H Beer, E H Beer, J F Wheel, D O M Reddin, W C Hobkirk, J J Davies, Geo W Gardiner, F J Nash and H McInnis. Mr Hopgood, the superintendent's private secretary, Mr Alexander Macdonald, chief clerk and Mr J. L. Thomson, station agent, were also in attendance. The special train left Charlottetown at nine o'clock and returned to the city about half-past eleven. The passing of the special train over the new road was signalled by the discharging of torpedoes and the blowing of whistles, all commemorative of the interesting occasion.

The work upon the new line was all done under the direct supervision of Mr Harry Boule, and has evidently been performed in an excellent manner. Altogether about a mile of new road has been completed, and about three-fifths of a mile has been saved. The building of the new road was all done by day's work. The cost was about \$25,000, \$10,000 of which was voted last year and \$15,000 this year.

Mr. Sharp estimates that the completion of this mile of track will mean an annual saving of about \$1,000 in the operating of the road; and calculating the number of trains passing over the road at six each day he estimates that the saving in the number of miles covered in the run of a year will be about one thousand.

Mr Sharp, Mr Houle, and the other railway people concerned in the work evidently attended to their part of the business in a painstaking manner.

Eyes Eight--Dress.

SIR,—Sometimes the officers of a militia company are at a loss to know why there is not a better attendance at drill and a greater interest displayed on the part of the men. Now if the men in the ranks are treated fairly—if they are correctly properly, when they make a mistake, while they are trying to do their best—in short, ordinary courtesy is shown to them, and they are not made to feel a certain loss of self-respect almost every time they go to drill, there would not only be a better attendance, but recruits would always be available to keep the Company at its full strength. One of the chief requisites in an officer is that he be a gentleman. He is entrusted, when in command, with a certain amount of authority, for the sake of utility not simply for display and self-aggrandizement. There is a limit to this authority, however, and the private has his rights, but these are not always recognized.

Soldiers for St. John's.

St. John's Nfld., November 19.—Captain Southy, of the Royal Berkshire regiment, aid-de-camp of the governor of Newfoundland, Sir Herbert Murray has returned to St John's from Halifax, where he had been to consult with the military authorities regarding the transfer of a force of 500 men to the garrison at St. John's in the event of war between Great Britain and France. He conveyed all the necessary information respecting the housing of the force here and the construction of local defences and has reported to Sir Herbert Murray that the contingents could be brought here from Halifax, by the way of North Sydney and the railway across Newfoundland, within 48 hours after the order for their despatch had reached headquarters at Halifax.

PERSONAL

Rev J F Johnstone has returned from a visit to New Brunswick and Quebec.

R V William Chapman, one of the pioneer Methodist ministers of western Ontario, is dead.

His Grace Archbishop Lewis, and Mrs. Lewis, have left for England, where they will hereafter reside. His Grace has been over fifty years in the Anglican Church, and over thirty years as Bishop of Ontario diocese. They will have residences both in London and Paris. A co-adjutor bishop will be appointed this winter for the diocese.

Denmark Will Retaliate.

BERLIN, Nov. 18.—Denmark is beginning to retaliate upon Germany for the expulsion of King Christian's subjects from northern Schleswig. The activity of the Prussian Government since these expulsions began have been unparalleled. Hundreds of persons—men, women, and children of all ages—have been forced to give up their homes and flee over the frontier into the northern peninsula. Germany, however, is not invulnerable, and the Danes know it. The Danish press is urging the striking of a blow at German trade. Denmark imports from Germany goods to the value of no less than \$35,000,000, annually, more than half as much as from all the rest of the world. Danes are urged to stop the importation of German manufactures, and the temper of the people is favourable to the proposition. An association of merchants has been formed in Copenhagen, the members of which are pledged to buy nothing that is imported from Germany.

The threat is not lost on Germany. Merchants here are tremendously stirred up over the prospect of losing so good a customer. Already Prince Hohenlohe, the Imperial Chancellor, has received scores of communications—some of them generously signed petitions—begging that the persecution of the Schleswig Danes may be forbidden.

From Cairo to the Cape.

BERLIN, Nov 18.—A move evidently is on foot by Germany to acquire the Portuguese colony of Angola, on the west coast of Africa. According to the Colonial Year Book, Angola is on the brink of economic disaster, and should revert to a strong power. The book adds that the general collapse of the Portuguese Empire is only question of months.

England is not expected to interfere in such an acquisition by Germany. In return it is proposed to cede to England a strip of territory along Lake Tanganyika, which lies just east of the Congo State, on the south coast of Africa. This juggling of territory will allow England to realize her dream of a British Africa extending from Cairo to the Cape.

Her outward cargo consisted of 342 boxes cheese from Charlottetown, 776 boxes from Couris, 457 boxes from Summerside, and some butter shipped by Mr T J Dillon, and a quantity of grain, potatoes and hogs consigned to the British market, including 500 boxes canned meat shipped by W Longworth.

Local and Other Items

PRESENTATION.—The Law Library has been presented with a number of volumes of the Dominion and the Quebec Statutes by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor.

ENGINE REPAIRED.—On Saturday last the locomotive which was injured recently by leaving the track at North Wiltshire was taken out for a trial trip after being repaired by Locomotive Foreman Poole and his men. The trip was quite satisfactory.

NON-SUIT.—On Saturday Judge Alley delivered judgment in an action brought against the City by Angus McDonald for not promptly arresting John Ring who broke the plate glass window of Mr McDonald's school in June last. Judge Alley held that the city was not responsible and non-suited the plaintiff.

OBITUARY.—Many will regret the death of Mrs F W Cannon, eldest daughter of J D Mason, Esq, of this city, which occurred last evening at St Eleanor's. Mrs Cannon had not been very well for several weeks, but her death was quite unexpected by her relatives here. Mr Cannon is left with a little boy two and a half years old to mourn his loss.

ST. JAMES' CHURCH.—The re-opening of St. James' Church, yesterday, after the completion of the repairs made necessary by the fire, was the occasion of drawing a large congregation to all the services. In the morning and evening the sermons were preached by the Rev. Mr. Gandier of Fort Mezey Church, Halifax. The morning sermon was very eloquent, the text being the 84th psalm. At the afternoon service the congregation was addressed by Revs W J Kirby and G M Campbell.

FOOTBALL.—At the C A A grounds on Saturday afternoon the football teams of the Prince of Wales College and St Dunstan's College lined up in the drizzling rain to decide the question of superiority. The ground was in a most objectionable condition, almost slippery enough to skate on. The Saints seemed to be better able to get hold of the ball than their opponents and they rolled up a score of 20 to 1. There were not many spectators present owing to the persistent rain.

SUDDEN DEATH.—The death occurred at his home, in Lake Verde, on Saturday night, of Mr Peter Kelly, merchant, of this city. His death was quite sudden. He had gone up to his home to attend a sale of stock taking place on the premises of his brother and the news of his death comes as a surprise to his many acquaintances in town. He was thirty-two years old and was a brother of Patrick Kelly of Montague. He was very well known in both town and country. His funeral took place at Lake Verde this morning to Vernon River, and was attended by many from Charlottetown.

BAPTIST CHURCH.—Yesterday Rev G P Raymond, M A., for the first time occupied the pulpit of the Baptist Church as pastor.

At both morning and evening services the attendance was good—in the evening indeed the church was crowded.

In the morning, Mr Raymond spoke on "Prayer," taking his text from Job 21:15. In the evening he spoke on "Four lessons from the Prodigal Son."

Both sermons, bore evidence of careful study, and original thinking.

FIRE YESTERDAY.—At a very early hour yesterday morning the alarm was rung for a fire in the store of J. B. Macdonald & Co, Queen street. The fire had evidently been smouldering some time before its discovery, as on the arrival of the firemen the shop was filled with smoke. On a table under the arc light in the centre of the store a large pile of clothing was found to be on fire. A great deal of water was applied, and by the time the fire was finally put out almost the entire stock of goods on the premises had been ruined. The fire is thought to have occurred from a spark dropping from the electric light upon the clothing. Mr Macdonald estimates his loss at \$16,000, partly insured.
