Lord Wolesley is among those who have suffered in the South African war. His young relative, Mr. Hubert Wolesley, of the Imperial Light Horse, was killed at the battle of Elandslaagte.

The funeral took place on Thursday, and the large attendance testified to the esteem in which the deceased was held by all classes and creeds. The services in the Roman Catholic church were of a very imposing character, and Rev. R. B. McDonald, of Rustico, preached an able sermon on the occasion. The church was draped in black. A wife, one son and three daughters are left to mourn.

Local and Other Items.

THE PROBS.—Today and Sunday—Moderate to fresh west and north winds, generally fair and cool.

ROBBERIES.—The Agriculturist reports that sneak thieves have lately been committing depredations in St. Eleanors and vicinity, where people have had a large number of geese, ducks, and chickens stolen. In one case a widow was robbed of her entire flock of geese.

KILLED AT FOOTBALL.—A Des Moines, Iowa, despatch says: The third football fatality of the season in Iowa occurred on the State University field at Iowa this afternoon. While playing in an inter-class game, Winfield F. Stephenson, of Des Moines, was violently thrown in making a tackle, and his skull was fractured. He died within 20 minutes.

THE CACOUNA.—The steamer Cacouna, of the Black Diamond Line, arrived from Montreal about nine o'clock this morning, bringing a large miscellaneous freight. She will leave on Monday for St. John's, Nfld, direct. She will have cattle, sheep and hay on deck. Her under deck space will be taken up with produce, etc., including 16,000 bags of oats shipped by Carvell Bros. and Nelson Rattenbury.

AN ENLARGING BUSINESS.—Messrs A. Horne & Co., have purchased the large brick building on Kent Street from Mr. R C McLeod, used by him as a carriage and machine show-room. Owing to their greatly increased business, it was necessary to have more accommodation, and they preferred buying to renting storage in different parts of the city. They will have their goods now in one centre, and intend to use the brick building as their headquarters. In it will be their office, carriages, machinery, seeds, etc. The old warehouse on upper Queen St. will be used for storing all kinds of produce, flour, cornmeal, and as a general feed store. They hope by the extra space obtained to be better able to meet the wants of their customers.
