World-Wide Arms Count Seen Possible

PARIS, Nov. 6 — (CP) — The United States was reported, ready tonight to accept the old Russian challenge for a world-wide arms count.

British, French and Canadian support was indicated for the U.S. move but most delegates were not hopeful of an atomic agreement in view of the foot-dragging American plan of inspection, whose terms were outlined previously.

Canada's External Affairs Minister, L. B. Pearson, indicated support of the American move but he declined to discuss details of the Dominion's delegation at the sixth United Nations General Assembly, called the U.S. proposal "useful initiative."

It was reported that the U.S. is ready to submit to a count of its atomic bombs and other weapons as part of an international disarmament plan if all other countries will do the same.

The plan is part of a peace package with which the U.S. hopes to seize the initiative against the Soviet Union in the United Nations General Assembly opening here tomorrow.

A Russian proposal to refer to the new assembly the question of giving China's seat to the Communists was smothered by a vote of 20 to 11, with 11 abstentions. Canada opposed the Russian proposal. The Russians are certain to revive the issue.

Island Author's Book Reviewed In U.S. Academy Journal

Among numerous reviews of Dr. Frank MacKinnon's book, "The Government of Prince Edward Island," the following appeared in the widely known American Journal, "Annals of the American Academy":

"The first exposition of the Government of a Canadian Province is herein made available in an exceedingly clear and interesting piece of writing. Not is it to be disparaged because it deals with a small political entity no larger than the State of Delaware nor with a larger population of 90,000, no larger than that of Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, or Fresno, California. It presents a significant account of the adaptation of the parliamentary system to a very small political unit.

"The author, a native of the Island and presently Principal of Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown, shows an intimate understanding of local public affairs and sets a very high standard for the promised series of similar volumes to cover the other nine Provinces. The work is based upon original sources, is well documented in footnotes, is done in splendid perspective and proportion, combines an academic and practical approach, and reads most interestingly. Copious use is made of data from the political life and governmental records of the Island.

"The scope and organization of the book follow conventional lines. Part I deals with the colonial era, from the assumption of British control in 1763 to the Dominion of union with the Dominion of Canada in 1871. The controversies with British authority and among local groups, the adjustment to self-government in 1851, the deep popular attachment to local autonomy and opposition to joining the Confederation, and the financial difficulties that finally broke down the resistance provide the background for an engaging historical narrative.

"Part II is a straight-forward institutional analysis of the present system of government, factual in content, clear and logical in statement, and with careful regard for interrelations. Lieutenant-Governor, Premier, Cabinet, administrative agencies, unicameral legislative assembly, the courts, and the local governments of the one small city and seven towns are all well covered. The political life, centering in the Liberal-Conservative party in the Liberal-Conservative Province relationships, is presented vividly and without bias.

"The work's primary contribution is its historical narrative and its analysis of the Island's contemporary system of government. Of comparable value is its exposition of the correlation of Dominion authority with provincial autonomy. The way in which a substantial amount of local democracy has been preserved under the direct Provincial Government that operates in the rural area, comprising over three-fourths of the population, is of particular interest."

NOTICE TO PUBLIC

Royal Visit Traffic Regulations

During the Royal Visit to Charlottetown on November 9, 1951, it will be necessary for safety and convenience, TO ENFORCE certain restrictions to regulate the traffic in the city and to insure that Their Royal Highnesses are seen by the greatest number of people.

During specified hours there must be absolutely no parking or traffic on the routes of the Royal Procession.

At 11:30 A.M. Their Royal Highnesses arrive C.N.R. Station and proceed to Province building via Weymouth, Euston, Gt. George, Grafton, Prince and Richmond Sts. No parking or traffic movement on these streets from 10:45 A.M. until Procession has passed to a reasonable distance, and then only with the greatest care for the safety of the many pedestrians.

At 12:30 P.M. the Royal Party proceed to City Hall via Richmond, Queen and Kent Streets. No parking or traffic movement on these streets from 11:30 A.M. and then only with the greatest care for all.

At 12:40 P.M. Royal Party will leave City Hall for Government House via Kent, Queen, Water, Rochford, Brighton Rd., Ambrose, McGill Ave., North River Road and Park Roadway. No Traffic or Parking on these streets between 11:30 A.M. and 1:00 P.M. Then with great care, as shown above.

At 3:00 P.M. Royal Party leave Government House via Park Roadway, Brighton Rd., Euston, Queen, Grafton, Weymouth, Longworth Ave. and Mt. Edward Road for the Experimental Farm. No traffic or parking on these streets between 2:45 P.M. and 3:30 P.M. Then as before watch the pedestrians.

At 4:25 P.M. Royal Party will leave the Experimental Farm for the Forum via Mt. Edward Road, Longworth Ave., Weymouth and Fitzroy Sts. No traffic or parking on these streets between 4:30 P.M. and 5:30 P.M. During the afternoon that portion of Fitzroy St., between Weymouth and Cumberland will be closed and barricaded to all vehicular traffic.

At 5:15 P.M. Their Royal Highnesses will leave Forum for C.N.R. Station, via Fitzroy and Weymouth Streets. No traffic or parking on these streets between 5:00 P.M. and 5:30 P.M.

At 7:45 P.M. Royal Party will leave C.N.R. Station for Charlottetown Hotel via Weymouth and Kent Streets. No parking or traffic on these streets after 7:30 P.M. until the Party have arrived at Charlottetown Hotel.

At 10:00 P.M. the Royal Party will leave Ch'town Hotel for Railway Wharf via Kent and Prince Streets. No Parking or Traffic on these streets after 9:45 A.M. until arrival at Wharf.

Traffic will be stopped over Hillsboro Bridge for approximately one half hour, possibly 11:00 A.M. to 11:30 A.M. Parties coming that way should keep this in mind.

No doubt there will be a great many people in the city that day; mostly by automobile or truck. It may be difficult to park close to the Procession routes, so it is suggested that traffic entering from North River Road can find a parking place in the field just west of the P.E.I. Hospital. Those coming in the Malpeque Road would find a good parking place on Elm Avenue where the Circus is usually held. Parties from St. Peters Road and Hillsboro Bridge should think of the Exhibition Grounds and adjoining fields. It is not imperative that all stop at these places, but it will relieve the traffic situation. Many out-of-town people with friends or relatives in the city could make arrangements to park in their yards. Citizens on streets not marked for the Royal Procession could also assist greatly by using their yards that day and leaving the streets for out of town people. For those attending the Experimental Farm there is a goodly sized parking lot available at the Matthew Wells plant just south of the farm. Properly parked cars will find miles of space on streets not covered by the Royal Party.

The Police ask only for your cooperation in a difficult task. They have no intention to herd, coerce or restrain the public; but to use only that amount of direction that will ensure the safety of all and no embarrassment to the Royal Couple. These instructions should be read in conjunction with any issued by the Royal Visit Advisory Committee.

Canadian Army Casualty List

OTTAWA, Nov. 6 —(CP) —The army today issued one of the longest casualty lists of the Korean war, reporting one man killed in action, one officer and 21 men wounded and two men injured in action.

This brought to 433 the number of casualties so far suffered by Canadian troops in Korean action, including 88 dead, 308 wounded, 34 injured, and two missing.
