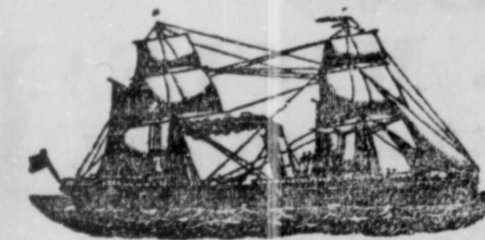

THE CATHEDRAL BAZAAR

Beautiful Decorations and Well-Stocked Booths, etc.,

The Grand Provincial Bazaar opens in the Cathedral basement hall this afternoon at 4 o'clock, and everything is now in readiness for one of the most unique exhibitions that it has been our pleasure to witness. The entrance to the hall is by way of Sydney Street, a large arch adorned with spruce and evergreens indicating the approach. The exit will be by way of Dorchester Street. The decorative arrangement of the hall is indeed most artistic, and reflects the highest credit on the committee in charge. The public were not admitted this morning, nevertheless our reporter was received in a courteous manner, and was shown through the various departments that adorn the hall. As the visitor enters he is struck with the magnificent display of decorative art that greets the eye, combining, as it does, a most clever and charming ornament of design with the necessary utility of such an exhibition. Indeed one imagines himself to be in a veritable city of fairy-land, so vivid are his impressions on entering upon this charming scene. And yet he sees faces and reads names that are familiar to him. "Hyde Park" is the first square that meets the visitor on his approach to this miniature city, and as he winds his way along he meets with such familiar ways as Victoria Row, Sunnyside, Cheap-side, Park Avenue, Champ de Mars, Columbia Avenue, Shamrock Boulevard, Lipton Terrace and a host of other streets which make up the general appearance of a large city. Indeed it is a real business metropolis—each street and avenue being lined on either side with magnificently-constructed emporiums of bazaar trade. The appearance of each booth is really grand and it would be difficult to particularize, for were the most careful critic to inspect successively "Utopia," "Italia," "Star," "Canada," "Shamrock," "Brittania," "Columbia," "Cosmopolitan," "Virginia," "Arcadia," etc., it would be almost impossible to suggest improvements, and our reporter would much prefer leaving these points to the judgement of visitors. Suffice to say that each excels in its own particular way, fancy tables exhibiting very many beautifully made-up articles, apron tables well stocked with all that is useful, candy tables, ice cream and soda, refreshment dinner and tea tables all being under, the choicest gifts that nature and culinary art can afford, art tables that would do honor to the classic masters, while last but by no means least, the home of the bivalve will greet the welcome visitor. In the centre are placed the larger articles donated to the bazaar, bearing the names of the generous donors and combining with the others to convey the most pleasing impressions. Our reporter being loath to leave the hall, arrived at our office somewhat late; otherwise this description would have been more lengthy. But he recommends everyone not to miss the Grand Provincial Bazaar.

PRELIMINARY REPORT

The Commission Recommends Immediate Action With Reference to Heating the Asylum,

The following is the text of the Commissioners preliminary report:

To His Honor Peter A. McIntyre, Esquire, Lieutenant-Governor, etc., etc., in Council.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOR.—The Commissioners appointed under Commission bearing date the ninth day of October, 1899, to enquire into the past and present management of the Hospital for the Insane, Falconwood, have the honor to submit this short preliminary report.

We commenced taking evidence at the Hospital on Tuesday, the tenth, and continued our investigation there and at the Provincial Building, until the evening of Friday, the thirteenth instant. We believe our enquiry has been as thorough as necessary and as circumstances would allow.

Until the stenographer's notes of evidence are translated and copied we are unable to prepare a complete and detailed report of our investigation.

In pursuing the enquiry one matter of supreme importance engaged our most serious consideration, namely, the system of heating the building during the winter season. It came out in evidence that the wards and rooms occupied by the patients and their caretakers were often uncomfortably cold—the windows are leaky, admitting at times snow or rain—that the heating apparatus is imperfect—and that this imperfect apparatus is not kept in operation during the night, even in the coldest weather, but the fires in the furnace are banked regularly at nine or ten o'clock, p.m. and allowed to remain so until about five o'clock in the morning, so that the temperature falls so low as to compel even the attendants on duty at night to wear overcoats or other extra clothing to keep themselves warm.

It further appears that owing to the defective heating apparatus, or some other cause, the rooms on the south side of the building receive no current of warmth when the wind blows from the south.

We are so strongly impressed with the urgent necessity of remedying this state of things without delay in view of the near approach of winter, that we hasten to call the immediate attention of Your Honor's Government to the matter and to recommend—

1. That a competent architect be at once directed to examine the system of heating in use at the hospital, with a view of improving the apparatus or of putting in an entirely new system.

2. That outside or storm windows be put on all the windows on the south side of the building.

3. That the Supervisor be directed to see to it that fires be kept on at night when required, so as to secure a temperature never below fifty degrees in all parts of the building occupied by patients, and a temperature of seventy-five degrees in any room or ward, if required, at the discretion of the Medical Superintendent, or the attendant in charge acting under his instructions.
