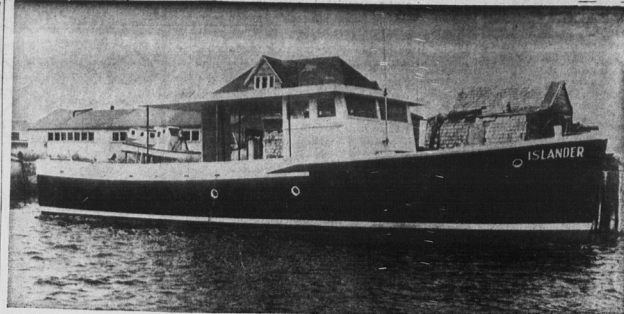

GARY, Ind. (AP)—A 22-year-old Cleveland brunette was abducted from a parked car and raped at knifepoint early Sunday.

The terror-filled ordeal for the slapsly white victim ended as a state trooper halted the car on the Indiana Toll Road and captured three youths. Two others fled despite a shotgun fusillade.

Authorities later found one of the youths clinging to a branch along the bank of the nearby Little Calumet river. The body of his companion was fished from the water five hours later.

State police said the assault victim, Mary Helen Taylor, was seized by three youths while sleeping in a parked car along a northern Indiana highway. Her boy friend was bound and gagged and left in a cornfield with the attackers in his car.

State Trooper Michael Rashette Jr., 38, spotted Ingram's auto and halted it. He ordered the five youths out of the car at gunpoint and told them to release Miss Taylor.

# Theatre Demonstration Planned Here Next Year

Prof. Alvin J. Shaw, Professor, N.B. chairman of the theatre conference of the Dominion Drama Festival, was in Charlottetown over the weekend to make preliminary arrangements for the conference, planned for Montserrat Hall May 15, 16 and 17, and designed as a training program for actors, directors, producers and anyone interested in theatre.

It is expected that the complete program for the conference will be announced when the national executive of the festival meets in Charlottetown, Oct. 5.

No definite commitments have been received from those expected to take part. Prof. Shaw said Saturday, but it is hoped that a distinguished British actor and producer and an outstanding theatre personality from Montreal will be among them.

A special feature of the conference will be a theatre demonstration, when the production of a play will be outlined from

the choice through casting, probable feature of the conference. Speakers, panels and discussion groups will be included in the sessions, but the outline of a play to be produced at the festival demonstration will be the keynote of the conference.

The sessions should be of particular interest to teachers and drama groups throughout the province. Prof. Shaw said.
