Burnt Out Boat Brought Ashore

A 37-foot lobster boat, sunk in shallow waters by its two man crew Thursday morning in order to extinguish a serious engine fire, was raised and brought ashore at Skinner's Pond yesterday morning.
Roy Doucette of Skinner's Pond and his helper Fred Doucette, were en route to the fishing grounds when the engine in their boat burst into flames.
Following an unsuccessful attempt to put out the fire, during which the boat owner suffered slight burns to his face and arm, the craft was taken in tow and brought into shallow water and flooded with water.
Damage to the stern of the boat was heavy. It is understood the boat was insured.

Successful Sewing Course Held By Augustine Cove W.I.

The Augustine Cove Women's Institute on Aug. 24 began two very pleasant weeks of sewing instruction under the leadership of Miss Bertha DesRoches and Miss Doris LeClair of the P.E.I. Women's Institute Handicraft Van. There were 18 members in the class, seven of which were school girls, 11 to 13 years of age. The course included instruction in waterwave, basket weave and diamond cushion making, both fabric and lambkin gloves, Tri Chem pen painting on pillow cases, runners and luncheon cloths, ensemble dresses, skirts, blouses, foam rubber slippers, baby bibs and booties and textile painting.
The popularity of this interesting and instructive course was shown by the enthusiasm of the workers and the regularity of their attendance at classes, which were held from 2.30 to 4.30 p.m. and from 7.30 to 9.30 p.m. each day Monday to Friday in the institute rooms of the Augustine Cove School.
The effectiveness of training could be seen, when girls who had never sewn before, modelled garments which would be a challenge to expert sewers.
On Friday, September 4, what had been achieved by the several members was put on display on long tables. Miss MacLeod, the Supervisor, and Mrs. Thompson of the Provincial W.I. staff and several visitors were present at this meeting. The items of clothing made were modelled for approval, and all other articles were shown to the supervisor and other visitors for closer inspection.
Miss MacLeod spoke to the gathering, complimenting the workers on their fine display and hoping they had learned much that would be helpful to them in the future. She was very glad such a variety of items had been undertaken, and said that one member could now help another, to make a larger variety of articles for herself.
She complimented the girls and stressed the benefits of 4-H sewing clubs, saying she would be very glad to help the district form such a club at any time.
A pleasant part of the meeting was the presentation of gifts to Miss DesRoches and Miss LeClair by Dinne Webster and Sandra MacFadyen. Both Miss DesRoches and Miss LeClair spoke briefly, thanking the members and stating that this demonstration was, they thought, one of the best they had yet had.
Singing "God Save The Queen" brought to a close this part of the meeting.
A social period and very delightful buffet luncheon was then very much enjoyed by all.
