## Japanese Fireworks.

Fireworks in Japan excel anything of the kind usually seen in Europe or on this continent, and are of two kinds, ground displays and rockets. Day fireworks are exclusively of the latter kind, as effect can only be produced by them in the air and at a distance; and as many of them consist of more or less sombre imagery traced in smoke or cloud, a clear blue sky is the best background. The full success of this is dependent not only upon a clear atmosphere, but also on calm weather. Some of these strange rockets were recently exhibited in San Francisco. Out of one of them burst clouds of variegated hue, with fantastic accessories. From another emerged a tricolor flag, which was seized by the wind and borne rapidly away. The rockets are shot into the air from mortars. Perfect accuracy of flight is thus secured, a result hardly attainable with stick and self-propulsion. The ordnance is made of wood. The ordinary range is 1,200 yards, though a higher elevation can be attained by affixing wings to the missile. A mortar of suitable bore is sponged out, a charge of powder is dropped into the muzzle, and a quick fuse is put into the touch-hole. The operator lets the grework carefully down till it touches the charge. A firestick is applied to the fuse, and instantly the contents of the gun are hurled straight into the air. The bursting charge is in the globular portion of the bomb, and this part is lowest in the gun, so that its time fuse, communicating with the detonants, may ignite with the discharge. But the whole case is so weighted that, as soon as it leaves the muzzle, top and bottom are reversed, with the result that the fuse burns, and the explosion or explosions take place upward.

## The Dufferin Book.

The New York World, in a column and a half review of Mr. George Stewart, Jr.'s, "Canada under the Administration of the Earl of Dufferin," says:—  
If it were only because it contains the text carefully revised by himself of many of the speeches which have secured for Lord Dufferin a brilliant reputation as an orator, the book would be of real interest to the general reader; but it also gives us a lively and in the main a fair and trustworthy history of the politics and progress of Canada since 1872. The last six years have been marked by a wide extension of the borders of the Dominion, by remarkable alternations in the fortunes of the Liberal and Conservative parties, by the Winnipeg and Columbian episodes, by the business troubles of 1873 and by the political reaction of 1877 and 1878. Here was abundant material for a judicious and skilful writer, and Mr. Stewart has handled it in the main with judgment and with skill.  
This, from a paper so discriminating as the World, is very high praise indeed.  
The World editorially contradicts the report that Lord Dufferin intends publishing a book on Canada on his return. Mr. Stewart's book, for which His Lordship reviewed his speeches and supplied considerable material, is the only publication in which the noble Earl takes a personal interest.

## NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 25.  
A special despatch from Fredericton to last evening's Globe says:—  
"R. R. Call and others filed a petition, yesterday, against the return of Jabez Snowball, of Northumberland County, as a member of the Dominion Parliament.  
"As the time approaches for the Permissive Bill Election, the interest increases. Meetings are being held in the evenings in the different Wards."  
OTTAWA, Oct. 24.  
The Victoria, British Columbia, vote stood: Sir John McDonald, 896; Decosmos, 538; Davis, 480.  
Masson did not arrive yesterday. He is expected to-day.  
PORTLAND, Me., Oct. 24.  
Schooner "Mary," of Jonesport, from Hillsboro, N. B., for Newark, went ashore last night on Ram Island; will probably go to pieces; crew saved.  
The British schooner "Haladin," from Granville, N. S., is ashore off Cape Elizabeth; will probably go to pieces; crew saved.  
LONDON, Oct. 24.  
The British brig "Silas Alward," from Chatham, N. B., for Ligni, France, has arrived at Falmouth leaky, lost deckload, fore and maintopmast jibsails and all attached.  
Steamer "City Rise," from Cardiff for Tybee, went ashore last night on one of the Scilly Islands, but was towed off, and sank in 6 fathoms of water.  
NEW YORK, Oct. 24.  
Only four deaths from yellow fever in Memphis yesterday, and but nineteen reported at New Orleans. The mortality at other places continues to decrease.  
LONDON, Oct. 24.  
The Cabinet is summoned to Council tomorrow. The Times says this step is undoubtedly well advised in view of the serious Indian situation and new controversies in relation to Turkey.  
No Indian Consuls Bills were sold yesterday. The Indian Government purchased exchange at Calcutta instead. This had a favorable influence on the silver market.  
Matthew, Buchanan & Co., merchants of Glasgow, have failed; liabilities £1,250,000.  
The Drumpellier Coal Company has also failed; assets £80,000.  
Fleming, who absconded, is not John Fleming, head of the London House of Smith, Fleming & Co., but his brother, J. Nicol Fleming, formerly director of the Glasgow Bank.  
LONDON, Oct. 24.  
The Journal de St. Petersburg strongly recommends Russia to assist the Ameer of Afghanistan with officers, arms and money; and to fortify the Passes on which Russia's position in Asia depends. It states that the Ameer has written to General Kauffman declaring his hope to be on him alone.  
The Russian Press unanimously advise that indirect aid be given the Ameer.  
A despatch from Poawul Pindec says fever continues to rage among the frontier troops. One-third of the British Lancers regiment at Peshawar is disabled by it.  
LONDON, Oct. 24.  
The damage by inundation on Damietta, a branch of the Nile, is estimated at two and a half million dollars. Two hundred and fifty lives were lost. The Government is accused of neglecting all precautions against such calamity.  
BERLIN, Oct. 24.  
The appointment of Count Trautmannsdorff, Austrian Ambassador to Germany, is considered unsatisfactory and regarded as due to clerical influence.  
Several German Socialist newspapers, anticipating suppression, announce discontinuance, but at the same time advertise the appearance of new journals by the same publishers.  
ROME, Oct. 24.  
It appears the Ministerial crisis will soon terminate. Gen. Borelli has accepted the Ministry of War; Signor Carrolle takes the Ministry of Foreign Affairs; and no great difficulty is anticipated in finding a satisfactory Minister of Marine.  
ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 24.  
The editor of the Russki Pravdo has received first warning for printing a letter to new Chief of Secret Police, asking him to deal leniently with political offenders. The Go has received first warning, and its sale on the streets is suspended, for attacking the anti-Socialist Bill.  
MADRID, Oct. 24.  
The Government is showing great severity in consequence of the increase of Intransigente Propaganda in Southern Spain. The editor of the Federalist has been arrested and four Liberal journals in this city, including the Imparcial, have suspended. The charge against them is resisting the gend's arms, and their case will be tried by court martial. The Government is believed to be actuated by a determination to resist the demand for a general election in February.  
CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 24.  
The Sultan has approved of the modifications made by the Porte in the British scheme of reforms for Asia Minor.  
Roumania has declined the proposals of Russia to maintain a military road through the principality. The Porte has assured Minister Layard that it will give a favorable reply this week, accepting British reform proposals with slight modifications.  
ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 24.  
Prince Dondoukoff Karsakoff has arrived at Sofia, where the Central Government of Bulgaria will be established, instead of at Tirnova.  
ROME, Oct. 24.  
It is reported that Admiral Brim has accepted the Ministry of Marine.  
CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 24.  
The Sultan to-day signed and returned to the British Minister a modified scheme for reforms in Asia Minor.
