(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) Prorogation of Parliament.

LONDON, Dec. 3. The British Parliament has been prorogued to meet again on the 15th February.

Death of Archbishop Tait.

LONDON, Dec. 3. His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury died at about eleven on Saturday night. It is understood that at the instance of Her Majesty the Queen, the Dean of Westminster has offered burial for the body in Westminster Abbey.

[He was a native of Scotland, the son of a Clackmannanshire attorney, or writer to the signet, and was born at Edinburgh on the 22nd Dec., 1811. His mother was a daughter of Sir Islay Campbell of Succoth, and Scotch Judge. He commenced his education at the High School, Edinburgh, from which he went to Glasgow University in 1827, and three years later was elected an Exhibitioner to Balliol College, Oxford, of which he became successively Scholar, Fellow and Tutor, and graduated B. A. in first-class honors. At Oxford he took a prominent part in opposing the Tractarian movement, and he was one of the four tutors who first drew the attention of the University authorities to the celebrated Tract No. 90, written by Newman. In 1842 the death of Dr. Arnold opened to him a wide field of usefulness, he being appointed head master of Rugby school, a position which he filled for eight years. In 1850 failing health induced him to resign that position and accept the demerit of Carlisle. There he began that active career as a clergyman for which he had been noted, and which contributed so much to his advancement. He originated and conducted additional Sunday services, devoted himself to visiting the sick, instructing the young and ignorant, and superintending the public charities of the town. The late Dr. Bloomfield having resigned the See of London, under a special Act of Parliament, in August, 1856, Dr. Tait was nominated to the vacancy. There he had a wide field for his energy and zeal, and he labored faithfully to improve the condition of his diocese. In 1863 he proposed, and, by his zealous efforts, powerfully contributed to the successful initiation of an extensive scheme for supplying the deficiency of church accommodation in London, by raising £1,000,000 in the course of ten years. On the death of the late Dr. Longley in 1868, Dr. Tait was appointed his successor as Archbishop of Canterbury. The University of Glasgow conferred on him the degree of L.L.D. in 1869. He presided over the Pan-Anglican Synod in 1867, the Church of Congress at Croxford in 1877 and the Conference of Anglican Bishops at Lambeth in 1878. Dr. Tait was the author of two volumes of sermons preached at Oxford, a work entitled "The Dangers and Safeguards of Modern Theology," "The Word of God and the Ground of Faith," published in 1863; charges to the clergy in 1866; "Some thoughts on the duties of the Church of England;" a charge to the clergy in 1875, besides many articles on education and kindred topics contributed to the reviews. Dr. Tait was married while head master at Rugby to a daughter of Archdeacon Spooner. She died in 1878.]

Dismissal of a Minister.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 3. Said Pasha has been summarily dismissed and the Turkish Council has been reinstated.

Arabi's Fate.

CAIRO, Dec. 3. A Court Martial was held here yesterday. Arabi pleaded guilty to the charge of rebellion; and in the afternoon the Court Martial sentenced Arabi to death. The Khedive has since commuted the sentence to exile for life. But Arabi is to be held amenable to the death sentence if he ever again enters Egypt or its dependencies.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Dec. 1. In the Commons, this afternoon, the Marquis of Hartington, Secretary of State for India, said if the consideration of the rules of procedure was finished to night Parliament would be prorogued to-morrow. Mr. Trevelyan, Chief Secretary for Ireland, said no official reporter had reported Mr. Healey's speech at Carlisle, but the Government had sufficient evidence to sustain his (Healey's) prosecution. Mr. Johnson, Attorney General for Ireland, informed Mr. Parnell that he was considering which of the two statutes to prosecute Healey under. The House, to-night, resumed the consideration of the rules relating to standing committees and they were passed. The passage of these rules completing the business of the session, was greeted with cheers.

LONDON, Dec. 1. The court martial instituted to inquire into the cause of the wrecking of the British man-of-war "Phoenix," which went ashore on the coast of Prince Edward Island, last September, has found that the vessel was lost through negligent navigation. The court severely reprimanded the commander and dismissed him from the service; the navigating lieutenant was similarly dealt with.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1. The debt statement issued to-day shows a decrease of the public debt during Nov. \$5,534,142.89.

DUBLIN, Dec. 1. Right Hon. Charles Dawson has been re-elected Lord Mayor of this city.

LONDON, Dec. 1. The Daily News' Cairo correspondent telegraphs he believes Arabi will plead guilty to a general charge of rebellion, and that the Egyptian Government will not press the charge of massacre and incendiarism. Arabi will then be sentenced to perpetual exile, retaining his sword, rank and emoluments. The Standard says Wm. Redmond, whom the Government intends to prosecute on account of his recent violent speech, is now on the Continent. He is a brother of Mr.

J. E. Redmond, member of Parliament for New Ross.

PARIS, Dec. 1. The report of the Budget Committee has been distributed in the Chambers. It predicts a deficit of 78,000,000 francs for the current year.

The Seine has risen 6-40 meters above the normal level. Houses at Norgent, Joinville, St. Maur, Amieres and Courbevois are being deserted through fear of disasters. Floods in the valleys of the Rhine are specially severe. The country between Chalons Sur Maine and Sprenay is inundated.

VIENNA, Dec. 1. The River Theiss and the affluents have overflowed. Marmaros district is inundated, several bridges damaged and railway embankments broken down. Dykes on the Theiss are in great danger.

MADRID, Dec. 1. At a meeting of the Dynamic Left party yesterday, resolutions were adopted, declaring Serrano should be recognized as the sole leader of the party and insisting upon the re-establishment of the Spanish Constitution of 1869, with slight modifications by act of Parliament, avoiding the constituent period. It was also agreed that Serrano should explain the programme of the party to the Senate.
