THE MARKETS.—The supply at the market to-day, with the exception of potatoes, was equal to demand, and prices in general are but little changed. Oats were quoted at 29 to 40c; hay at 25 to 28c, and mackerel at 5 to 8c each. No potatoes were offered, though many were waiting. They are quoted at 19 to 23c. A few strawberries and cauliflower were in for the first time this season, and were purchased by Mrs. J. J. Davies. The strawberries sold for about 25c per pint.

A FATHERLY WATER-DOG.—A silky was landed on the Ferry Wharf, from one of the steamers, on Friday evening last, and was called for by a lady, being there still for an hour or two. Ever since the silky was landed from the steamer, it has been faithfully guarded by a small dog, which growls violently when any person approaches him. He has never left his charge for an instant since it was landed on the wharf. Last night one of the watchmen gave the dog some food, the first it had since beginning his vigil.

SPORTS.—Arrangements have been completed by which a number of our bicyclists will take part in the Summerside races on July 1st. The events will be one-half mile, one mile and three mile races. There are twelve entries in all from Charlottetown—four in the half, three in the one, and five in the three mile. It is expected that fifty wheelmen will go up to Summerside on the 1st, besides many excursionists. A special train will carry those wishing to "take in" these races, to and from Summerside at a reduced rate. The members of the Charlottetown Cycle Club, in uniform, will parade on the Driving Park, before the race. It is expected that the Summerside club will also join in the parade.

HOME AGAIN FROM ROME.

Bishop Macdonald and Rev. Dr. Walker Return Last Evening.

THE SERVICE IN THE CATHEDRAL.

Papal Benediction to Be Imparted at High Mass on Sunday Next.

SEVERAL hundred people—all denominations and classes being represented—were present at the railway station last evening when the mail express arrived from Summerside, and a hearty welcome was given His Lordship Bishop Macdonald and Rev. Dr. Walker upon their return from Rome. The train reached the city about a quarter of seven, and as it rolled into the station the League of the Cross Band rendered appropriate music.

From the station His Lordship and Rev. Dr. Walker were driven to the Cathedral, their carriage being preceded by the League of the Cross Band. At the Cathedral there was Solemn Benediction, followed by a Te Deum. His Lordship Bishop Macdonald was celebrated, assisted by Revs. Dr. Doyle and A. E. Burke, as deacon and sub-deacon. The music by the choir was excellent. There was a large congregation.

After the service in the Cathedral His Lordship and Rev. Dr. Walker were called upon at the Episcopal residence by His Honor the Lieut.-Governor and Mrs. Howland, a number of other friends, and warmly welcomed home. The League of the Cross Band rendered some choice music on the lawn in front of the Palace. The choir and band were afterwards entertained by the Bishop.

The party—their Lordships Bishop Macdonald, Sweeney and Cameron, and Rev. Dr. Walker—left for Rome about the middle of April, and had a very pleasant trip. They were Bishop Macdonald's first visit to Rome, and after his audience with the Pope, he visited the principal cities in Italy, England, Scotland and Ireland, Rev. Dr. Walker accompanying him. His Lordship and Rev. Dr. Walker both look exceedingly well after their trip.

They arrived in Montreal by the Quebec express on Sunday morning, and remained there until Monday, when they left for home. Rev. Dr. Walker celebrated mass in St. Bernard's church, on Sunday, and at the conclusion of the service Bishop Macdonald gave a most interesting account of his visit to Rome. According to the Times His Lordship said that two months ago, in company with their Lordships Bishop Cameron, of Antigonish, and Bishop Sweeney, of Antigonish, he started for Rome and arrived there in two weeks. One week after their arrival they were admitted to the presence of the Vicar of Christ, His Holiness Pope Leo XIII. His Holiness, who is 86 years old, looks very feeble. His emaciated form is the color of alabaster, and one is impressed at first sight that he has not long to live; but when he begins to speak you will see that there is lots of vigor in that old man. He takes great interest in the Catholic church, and inquired very earnestly about the church in the Provinces, to which the Bishop replied that the people of the Provinces were very devout and attentive to their duty. His Holiness also spoke of the advancement of education. In referring to his imprisonment, His Holiness was moved to tears. He said that, unlike the meanest laborer, who could have his freedom, he was obliged to remain a prisoner in his palace. This deplorable state of affairs, which causes the descendant of St. Peter to be imprisoned in his palace, was a sad plight to be recorded in the nineteenth century. The ruling of the Catholic Church weighs heavily on His Holiness, and the fact of his imprisonment tends greatly to shorten his life.

Speaking of the country and its people, Bishop Macdonald said that in Italy it is an unusual thing to see in the centre of a field of grain a cross. His Lordship stated that on visiting the Shrine of Loretto he was informed that over a million pilgrims visited the Shrine last year and over five thousand had visited in the week before he arrived, many of the pilgrims being from France and Germany. During the week in question eighteen miracles were wrought, one being a child who had a withered arm from birth and another in the case of a man who had a broken leg. The man's leg could not be set and he was obliged to go around on crutches. After the medical man was examined by many physicians who were unable to find the place where the limb had been broken, the bones were so perfectly set. On His Lordship's visit to London they celebrated Mass in the Ely Church, which belonged to the Bishops of Ely before the reformation and was the first church the Catholics succeeded in getting back. On their Lordship's visit to Scotland they celebrated Mass in the Presbyterian church was going on. From Scotland they went to Ireland, visiting Dublin, Cork and Londonderry. His Lordship said that the people of Ireland were the most devout people he had met on his whole trip.

In the evening verses were sung by Rev. Dr. Walker, and after the presentation of an address to His Lordship Bishop Sweeney, Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was given by His Lordship Bishop Macdonald, assisted by Father Meahan as deacon, and Dr. Walker as sub-deacon.

Sunday Bishop Macdonald will address his people at St. Dunstan's Cathedral and impart to them the Papal Benediction lovingly granted by Pope Leo XIII.

And further we do hereby appoint Rev. S. James, A. West and W. Pierce to represent our case before the Stationing Committee, who will possibly show the impracticability of the plan proposed by the Annual District meeting. This Quarterly Board will not entertain this question of change for one moment.
