On Leave From United States Navy

—Mr. and Mrs. Edmund G. Arsenault recently... the pleasure of having their son Timon home on leave after being absent for over three years.
Timon is serving in the American Navy on the oil tanker U.S.S. Nespelen which is supplying high octane gas to the naval bases along the east coast of Africa, the Mediterranean Sea and also the weather stations in Greenland. They were over this trip for the third time this summer from Norfolk, Virginia, up to Resolute Bay and Thule, Greenland.

The tanker carries 16,000 barrels of gas and a crew of 125 men.
Timon has had some interesting experiences, especially last fall when they were in Africa and were permitted to visit some of the villages and learn about the Arabs, how they live and their trade in stores.

He expects to go to the Mediterranean Sea in November for six months to relieve another oil tanker. Last year Timon rejoined the navy for a term of six years. His present work is in the gunnery department and when they go in training he has six men under him. He says he enjoys his work very much.

"Ghost Army" Fights In Korea

NEW YORK, Sept. 29 (AP)—A "ghost army of forgotten men"—Koreans from Japan—is fighting alongside United Nations troops in Korea, a CBS broadcast said today.
George Herman, CBS radio chief in Tokyo, said in a report from Japan the strange army may number "as many as 8,000."

Their uniforms are U.S. service uniforms, and with U.S. service numbers, the broadcast said, but top U.S. commanders have denied knowledge of their existence.
"It is an organization scathing denounced by Communist radio stations as 'The Tokyo Volunteer Group,'" the broadcast said, adding:

"The Communists charge that it's a pirate army of Japanese troops fighting in Korea. They're wrong. U. N. headquarters in Tokyo says there is no outfit known as 'The Tokyo Volunteer Group.' They're also wrong."
The broadcast said CBS men in Pusan and Suwon had confirmed that the group "is a ghost army of forgotten men, displaced underlings, whose nationality is under dispute."

who already held the world's auto speed record of 394 miles an hour, had covered the measured mile in 17.4 seconds—an average of 206.89 miles an hour—to become the fastest man on water.

But Cobb will not be credited with the mark since two other men, the measure of the shattering explosion in the waters of the legendary horn-headed monster of Loch Ness cheated Cobb out of attaining that distinction.

Before the accident Cobb may have hit a top speed of 240 miles an hour at a time, witnesses said. Then the 31-foot hydroplane, roaring down the course for a triumphant finish, seemed to bob and dive as it hit cross waves set up by attendant boats.

Cobb's wife, whom he married two years ago, hid her face in her hands and turned away as the plywood and aluminum boat exploded.

When the smoke and spray cleared, only four pieces of the wreckage could be seen from the shore. These quickly disappeared beneath the surface.

P.E.I. Gov't Not Interested In Old \$'side Post Office

It was learned yesterday that the Provincial Government is not interested in purchasing the old post office building in Summerside on which the Government had priority rights to buy. The Town of Summerside would thus become next on the priority list and in the event that the council decides not to purchase the building it can then be sold to a private party or parties.

Up to the present, the Town of Summerside has not reached a decision on the matter although it is understood that the council will meet this week to decide if the building shall be purchased for the Town of Summerside.

It was also learned yesterday that if the council decides against the purchase, that two local men have placed bids on the site and it is presumed that the building will be converted into a private enterprise, should the bids of these men be accepted.

Should the town decide to purchase the property it will be used to house various civic departments. It is understood that the Summerside library from its present quarters to the post office building would be considered by the Town Council.

Water, Sewerage Contract Let In Summerside

Following a special meeting of the Summerside Town Council held last week at which the Water and Sewerage Commissioners were authorized to spend up to \$18,000 to install a water and sewerage line in the east end of the town, the commission announced yesterday that a contract had been awarded to Morrison and MacRae for this work. Amount of the contract is \$16,917.90.

Two lines will be laid, one in the vicinity of the Hall Manufacturing Co. Ltd. property leading into the harbor, to service homes on Water Street East, as far as the Eastern Brook and the other connecting Ottawa Street with Harward, east of the electric plant.

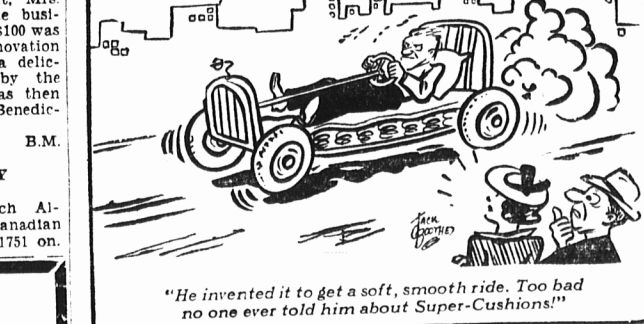
