

A Boy's Sad Death.

A week ago on Monday, two young lads, A. Strong, left their home in Digby, N.S., without bidding good-bye to their parents. Apparently their intention was to reach Boston, as they took the road towards Bear River. After finding no vessels ready to sail for Boston, they continued their journey towards Halifax, seeking work at various houses. They travelled past Annapolis with-out finding employment. On Monday evening at some good Samaritan's they got supper. Next day they continued their journey eastward, but learning that they had been recognized at Annapolis, and fearing pursuit, they entered the neighboring woods, where they soon became bewildered, and so they wandered about during the whole of the terrible stormy Tuesday. On Wednesday morning the younger lad, about 15 years, being worn out through hunger, fatigue and terror, could travel no further. His brother, about one year older, took off his own coat, placing it over his brother, and in a lone attempt to find his way out of the woods in search of succor. On the same afternoon with joy he discovered a house on a rising ground, but on hastening towards it his progress was stayed by a deep stream. He called for assistance during the whole of that afternoon. His cries were heard at intervals, but the urgency of appeal was not suspected. Only when nightfall came, and the cries were still continued, did the inmates of the house suspect that a fellow creature was calling for assistance. They hastily made a raft, crossed the stream, and found the poor exhausted young fellow, carried him back and took care of him. Next morning the good people of Dalhousie road turned out in search of the younger boy, and only on Saturday did they discover his body beneath the cover of his brother's jacket.
