Sun rises today at 4.33 a.m. and sets at 7.48 p.m.

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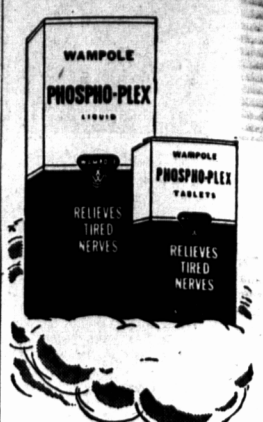
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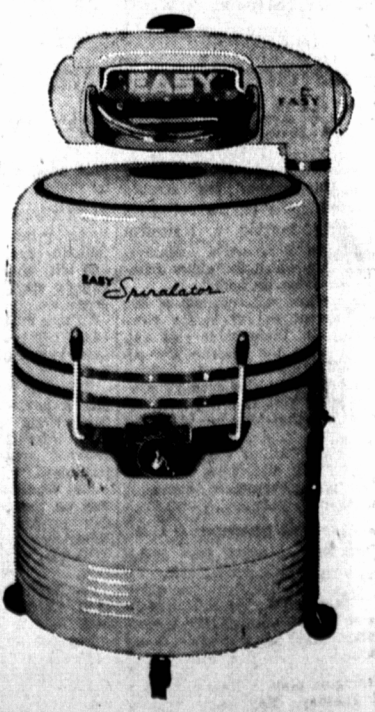
