Injunction Issued Against 75 Strikers

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP) — Supreme Court Judge W. Arthur I. Anglin Thursday issued an interim injunction against a strike by about 75 members of the Saint John Local of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (I.B.E.W.).

The strike began early Thursday against the Electrical Contractors Association of Saint John in a dispute over wages and fringe benefits. The injunction, effective until Tuesday, prohibits picketing by the union of construction sites where members of the contractors' Association are engaged. It also prohibits the union from "authorizing, continuing or engaging in the strike."

Earlier, local business agent G.A. Soucy said the 300-member local is willing to negotiate for additional fringe benefits in lieu

of a wage increase. The present rate is \$2.20 an hour.

Strikers picketed 17 projects in the city Thursday. Included was a Prince William Street office building site, a senior citizens housing project in the north end and a low-income housing development at Millidgeville.

Mr. Soucy said the strike, against local contractors only, had been given the support of all trade unions in the city and the New Brunswick Federation of Labor. He said the union did not want to hamper public emergency service and would supply electricians "free of charge" if required in emergencies.

Some workers, members of several unions involved in construction work who were at their jobs before picketing started, remained at work Thursday.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says cloud covered the Maritimes late Thursday evening. Rain was falling in western Nova Scotia while snow was falling in western New Brunswick.

A disturbance now crossing the St. Lawrence River Valley, will pass through New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia today. Precipitation will gradually spread eastwards to reach Cape Breton this morning. Snow will change to intermittent rain and drizzle this morning.

Woman Dies In Fire; No Assistance Given

HALIFAX (CP) — Woodbury Nicholson, principal of Middle Beaverbank and Kinsac Consolidated School, said Thursday the residents of Middle Beaverbank were never approached by anyone to arrange fire protection for the community.

A fire at Middle Beaverbank Wednesday resulted in the death of Mrs. David Davis, 47, who jumped from a second-storey window to escape flames. Her daughter and granddaughter were taken to hospital with burns and lacerations. The Sackville Fire Department, half a mile away, refused to answer the alarm.

Fire Chief Harold Parker said the department had been given strict instructions by the Sackville Safety Committee to stay within its own territory.

He said the department had earlier offered to help Middle Beaverbank to organize a department but residents refused. "We have never turned down any referendum on this matter

MONTAGUE — The death of Mrs. J. Mortimer MacLean, one of Montague's best known and loved senior citizens, occurred yesterday evening at her home following a lengthy illness.
