**Canadian Arsenals Ready For Big Munitions Orders**

OTTAWA, Aug. 3 — (CP) — Canada's Crown-owned arsenals are geared to start full-scale production at any time. All they await is defence orders, now looming on the horizon.

Meanwhile, informed quarters announced, shell-filling and small arms production and the production of heavy guns jog along at the same old pace—the peacetime pace before Korea.

The Crown-owned arsenal plants are spread over Ontario and Quebec. In Ontario gun ammunition is produced at Lindsay, small arms at Long Branch and radar instruments at Leaside. Quebec holds government plants for explosives at Valleyfield, heavy guns at Longueuil, arsenals at Quebec City and shell filling at St. Paul l'Ermitte.

A decision by the Canadian Government to send ground troops to Korea—which could be shaped at Wednesday's session of cabinet—is the vital factor in Canada's arsenals output.

Such a decision, whether or not accompanied by extensive American orders for Canadian supplies, will mean full steam ahead for small arms ammunition and shell production. But the point still will have to be settled as to which force the Canadian troops will be attached.

If Canadian troops are merged with Commonwealth forces, the arsenals will continue production on current patterns—that is, British patterns. Decision to attach Canadian troops to American groups will mean a sharp swing-over to American production lines.

It may take weeks before a Cabinet decision to send ground troops to Korea—or to Japan if Korea falls—will become effective. Prime Minister St. Laurent has given Parliament the promise that it will be reassembled and the question put before it for approval.

More immediate, said officials, is the expectation that Canada will get orders from the United States. However, there still is no indication of the quantity, or the shape or form in which the orders will come.

**Leaving Shortly For Copenhagen**

Mrs. Malcolm MacLeod, Lorne Valley has arranged to leave for Montreal on August 14, enroute to Copenhagen where she will represent the P. E. I. Federation of Women's Institutes at the Conference of the Associated Country Women of the World to be held from Sept. 9 to 12. Mrs. MacLeod will join the other Canadian delegates at Montreal, and sail from there on the Canadian Pacific "Empress of France" on August 18.

The party will be divided into two sections one of which will go direct to Norway and Sweden, while for the other an itinerary has been arranged which includes a tour through England and Scotland visiting selected Women's Institutes at which the various delegates will deliver addresses, ending up with a visit to Denmark, Oxford; the training college for members of the British Institutes. This section will then proceed to Copenhagen, and at the conclusion of the Conference there, will visit Paris, The Hague and other points of interest.

On return to England, Mrs. MacLeod will spend a month visiting her old home in Kent, which she left forty years ago, and other parts of England where various members of her family reside. She expects to be back on the Island early in November.

**Truman Request Would Mean Arms Orders For Canada**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 — (AP) — President Truman announced that the best way to prevent future outbreaks against the peace of the world is to see that United States' allies are properly armed. That's why, he said, he's asking for \$4,000,000,000 to arm anti-communist countries.

Officials said the largest part of the new arms orders would go to United States industry but Canadian factories would also share in the fund. Most of the money would be spent for heavy equipment such as tanks, artillery and other weapons which take up to two years to manufacture.

"It now is clear," Truman said in a letter to Congress, "that the free nations must accelerate the efforts they are making to strengthen their common security." Truman said he isn't sure how much each country will need. But he gave this breakdown on the areas to be helped:

North Atlantic ... \$3,504,000,000  
Greece, Turkey, Iran ... 100,000,000  
Philippines, Asia ... 300,000,000

Truman scarcely had finished making his request before Chairman Millard E. Tydings (Dem.-Md.) of the Senate armed services committee said \$4,000,000,000 isn't enough. Tydings did not say how much he thinks Truman should ask for.

The \$4,000,000,000 would be in addition to a \$1,222,500,000 arms aid program which already has been authorized.

**British Dolls Are Versatile**

LONDON, Aug. 1 — (CP) — British doll manufacturers are producing a variety of animated dolls which should capture their share of export dollars.

One model, the "crawling baby," with a clockwork motor, can be made to crawl along the floor. Made with a warm, flesh color, it is accompanied with patterns for extra clothes.

A talking doll, named "Baby Lou," is a lifelike model, with skin that can be bathed and powdered. "Lou" will probably be sounding off nearly all the time, as she sobs when pinched, cries when spanked and coos when cuddled.

One of the top designs incorporates an ingenious sound-track which reproduces a human voice. With a repertoire of singing, speaking, laughing and gurgling, it can say "mummy, pick me up" and various other phrases. It has even been made to sing a Spanish nursery rhyme.
