## 5th Kings To Be Out, 12 Seats For Queens

The elimination of multiple voting, a hike in Legislative representation for Queens County and a modification of the property vote were the major recommendations in the report of the Royal Commission on Electoral Reform tabled in the Legislature yesterday by Premier Walter Shaw.

Second reading — approval in principle — was given in the Legislature last night to a bill to set up the Senior Citizens Housing Corporation, a Crown corporation, having capital stock of \$1,000,000, through which the housing project will be undertaken.

## Three Honorary Degrees Will Be Awarded By SDU

Hon. Thane A. Campbell, Chief Justice of Prince Edward Island will address this year's graduating class at St. Dunstan's University on May 15 and will be awarded the degree of Doctor of Laws (honoris causa). Honorary Doctor of Laws degrees will be also conferred by the University on Sister Frances Loyola, C.S.M., Superior General of the Sisters of St. Martha of Prince Edward Island and on Dr. A.A. MacDonald, the renowned 80-year-old medical doctor from St. Louis who served in the medical service in Eastern Kings County.

He was elected to represent First Kings in the provincial legislature in 1915, 1927, 1927, and 1931 and served as speaker of the legislature from 1932 to 1935.

Dr. MacDonald's forerunners came to Prince Edward Island on the "Alexander" in 1772. He was educated at St. Dunstan's University and at McGill where he received the Degree M.D., C.M., at the age of 28. His six years of service as a medical doctor have been devoted almost entirely to the people of his native eastern Kings County, where he still carries on his extensive practice.
