About an hour after commencing operations she succeeded in freeing the imprisoned vessels from the grasp of the ice king, and they proceeded on their course. The steamer M. A. Starr, Capt. Ferguson, arrived from Halifax via intermediate ports at half-past three o'clock this afternoon. She had a very heavy passage, during which the first mate, Mr. McNevin, fell into the hold and had his collar bone broken. She had a small cargo and one passenger. The M. A. Starr will load with produce and sail on return at midnight. An English paper states that "Prince Lucien Bonaparte has recently tested some white fish from the lakes of Canada. Speaking of the white fish of Lake Ontario, he says: "I have found it really excellent fish, and in my opinion it is superior to any of the fresh-water fish in Europe, not excepting the ambr chevalier of the Lake of Geneva, the carpioine of the Lake of Garda, and the char of the English lakes." The great inter-provincial Grit meeting which was to take place at Truro on Tuesday was hardly a success. At the last moment it occurred to ex-Premier Pipes that a repeal meeting would be an excellent thing to stay away from. Mr. Davies, who was booked to be there, also sent his regrets. Attorney General Longley escaped to Cape Breton and Mr. Fielding made the speeches. The only new thing he said, which was new for him was that in his opinion, Riel should not have been hanged. He urged the people to vote for Blake and to set their faces for repeal.—St. John Sun. The mounted police of the North-West have been engaged for a few weeks past in clearing out a lot of rough characters in Donald, B. C., and Calgary and Banff, N. W. T. The great trouble is with the illicit liquor sellers. Liquor goes through in bond from Winnipeg to Donald, which is just across the line in British Columbia. At Donald it is released from bond, and then it is very easy to roll it back down the hill again to Banff and Calgary. The mounted police are doing their best, and a number of very heavy sentences have recently been imposed. Persons desirous of spending a pleasant evening, as well as furthering a good cause, could not do better than attend St. Joseph's Agony Fair, to be held in the Market Hall on the 20th inst. The usual amusements will be provided and many new features are to be introduced. The lotteries, which did not take place at the recent bazaar, will be held at the Fair.

Boston Markets.

DECEMBER 8. POTATOES—There has not been much change in the Potato market the past few days. Eastern and Northern stock in fair demand and steady. Provincial receipts continue liberal and prices rule low, owing to the poor condition of the stock. EGGS—Trade has been light and only strictly fresh lots sell readily at 27 to 28c. per dozen. Other kinds are slow. Best P. E. Island rule at 25c., and Canada at 24c. FISH TRADE—The Fish market is passing through its quiet season, and the volume of trade is light. Dealers are operating cautiously but stocks are small, and prices are on a steady basis. Mackerel are in light receipt, and higher rates are expected when trade revives. We quote Bays nominally \$20 to \$25 for extras; \$17 to \$18 for No. 1; \$13 to \$15 for No. 2; and \$11 to \$12 for No. 3. No. 3. No. 2 and P. E. Island Mackerel rule at about previous prices. Sales of extra No. 1 at \$25; ordinary No. 1 at \$15 to \$18; No. 2 at \$12 to \$13; and No. 3 at \$8 to \$10 per bbl., including medium and large. Total receipt of Mackerel at Boston the past week 800 bbls., including 771 bbls. from Provincial and 29 bbls. from domestic ports.
