

Many Problems Discussed At Trade Board Meeting

SUMMERSIDE — A resolution commending the Lobster Carnival committee and expressing the hope they will carry on again next year was unanimously approved at last night's meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade held in the Civic Building.

Mr. C.R. MacLagan, who is leaving next month to take up his new duties in Montreal, presided.

Although this year's lobster carnival parades were described as "disgraceful" by one member, he nevertheless stated he felt the carnival was a good thing for the town and should be retained. He stated there were many complaints from tourists regarding the parades but they were generally surprised and delighted with the price and excellence of the lobster suppers served at the carnival. He noted that many local people complained of the price of the lobster suppers but he told the meeting he had paid \$4.95 for a lobster supper while visiting in Massachusetts and the meal wasn't nearly as good as the one served at the carnival.

It was agreed that many things have to be improved, or in the case of parades, perhaps done away with, but all felt the carnival was a tourist attraction that left considerable money in the town and should be continued.

The discussion on the carnival followed Mr. MacLagan's remarks in reference to the general committee in which he said "we can't continue unless we get the support and enthusiasm of the local people."

WANT NEW FERRY

After a discussion on the present ferry service to the mainland, and in view of the fact it will take five to seven years to build a causeway if it is found feasible to do so, it was decided to send letters to the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade and the various Island Boards requesting support in endeavouring to get a new car ferry.

Mr. John Wright stated that requesting a new car ferry would in no way prejudice the chances of a causeway being built if it is found feasible according to information from Department of Transport Officials.

TOURIST BUREAU

Correspondence read by the president from the Provincial Treasurer's Department revealed that the Summerside Tourist Bureau would get no further assistance from the government once the Bureau at Albany Corner goes into operation. The latter also stated that the Department was dispensing with the

services of the girls who act as information guides on the car ferries, and it was decided to write the Department requesting this move be reconsidered.

A letter from the Town Council requesting the Board contact the proper authorities in getting a sign erected at Read's Corner denoting that Charlottetown can be reached via the Trans Canada Highway is to be acted upon. At present the only sign at Read's Corner indicating the route to Charlottetown is by way of Kensington.

Mr. Amos Humbley commended members of the Summerside Police Force for apprehending horn blowers and for handling traffic on Water Street at peak periods. He stated horn blowing has decreased and traffic congestion has lessened at noon and supper hours.

The board went on record as pledging support to the Summerside Branch of the Canadian Legion in developing a 4-acre property at Summerside East for road side tables, picnic site etc.

The Legion laid plans for the project this summer but failed, after repeated attempts, to get an interview with government officials regarding their part in

the development of the site before their option expired.

A letter is to be sent to Prince County M. P. Dr. Orville Phillips, asking him to inquire into the reported potato crop failure in anticipation of exporting Island potatoes to that country this fall. A similar letter is to be sent to Mr. Watson Jamer, agent general in London England.

Mr. John Mungall stated he was happy to see the town has agreed to assist in the Hillcrest housing development by means of supplying municipal services and felt this new addition to the town would be of great benefit. He also expressed his disapproval of the charred wall still standing on Water Street six months after the fire and suggested there may be some by-law the town can enforce to have it torn down as it is an eyesore.

Mr. Errol Laughlin told the meeting that some local stores are using farm products, such as butter, as loss leaders thus endangering the primary producer and some discussion was held on this matter.

Discuss Stiffer Sentences In Impaired Driving Cases

SUMMERSIDE — With the seemingly increasing number of drunken driving cases in Police Court at Summerside, Police Chief Peter White suggested to the Court presided over by Magistrate Hinton, that those convicted on the impairment charge and morning that the jail term of those convicted of impaired driving be made commensurate with the seriousness of the offense.

Police Chief White pointed out that while the fine for being intoxicated in a public place was only \$20, the alternative was fifteen days in jail. In the case of impaired driving the fine was customarily \$100, but that the alternative was only seven days in jail, the same as that given on a charge of driving intoxicated where it is a mandatory sentence.

Magistrate Hinton explained that to increase the jail sentence for impaired driving to 14 days would mean that those convicted on the impairment charge and who elected to serve the jail sentence, would serve a term longer than those sentenced on the driving intoxicated charge which carried the mandatory 7-day sentence.

Magistrate Hinton, however, agreed with Police Chief White that the situation was becoming more serious, and suggested that stiffer sentences might prove a deterrent, but that this was a matter for the Attorney General's Department.

Farm Scheme Is Discussed

ALBERTON — Mr. R. C. Bethune of the Settlement Division of the Department of Citizenship and Immigration at Halifax visited Alberton yesterday in connection with the West Prince farm resettlement scheme, a project being sponsored by the Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade with the object of attracting farm settlers to the area.

Mr. Bethune called on the secretary of the board, Mr. C. R. Leard and Mr. William Reddin, chairman of the committee presently preparing a brief on conditions in Western Prince and a list of farms for sale. Other committee members are Merritt Callaghan of Alberton and Ralph Adams, O'Leary.

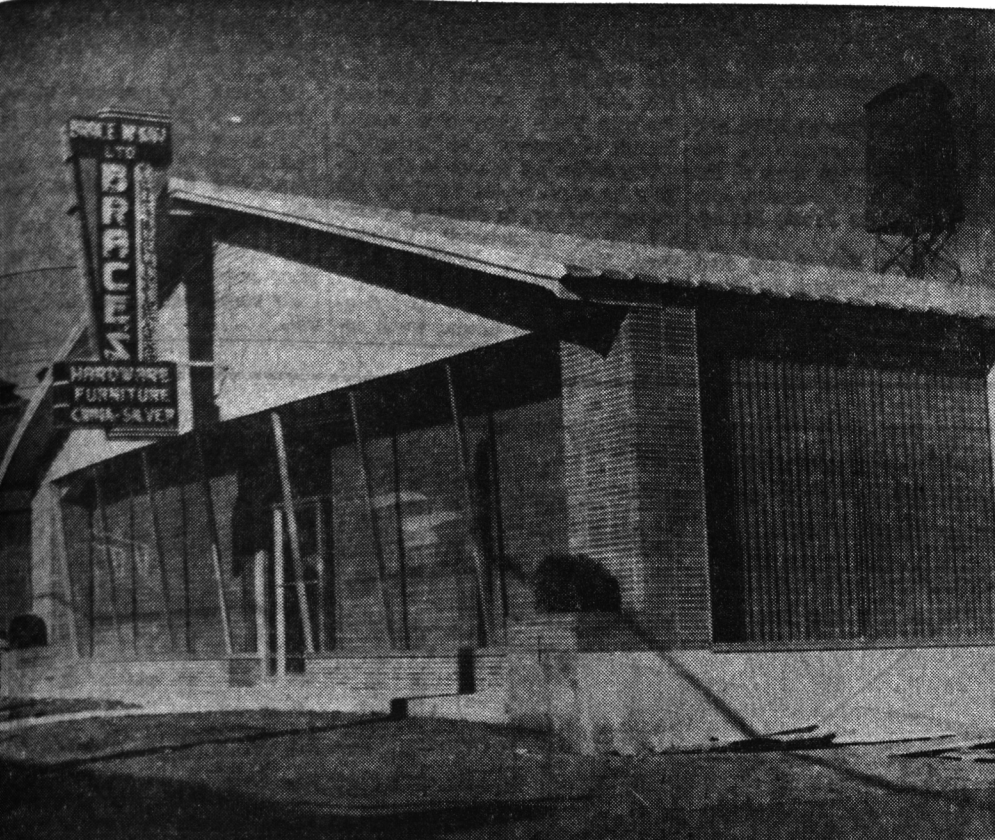

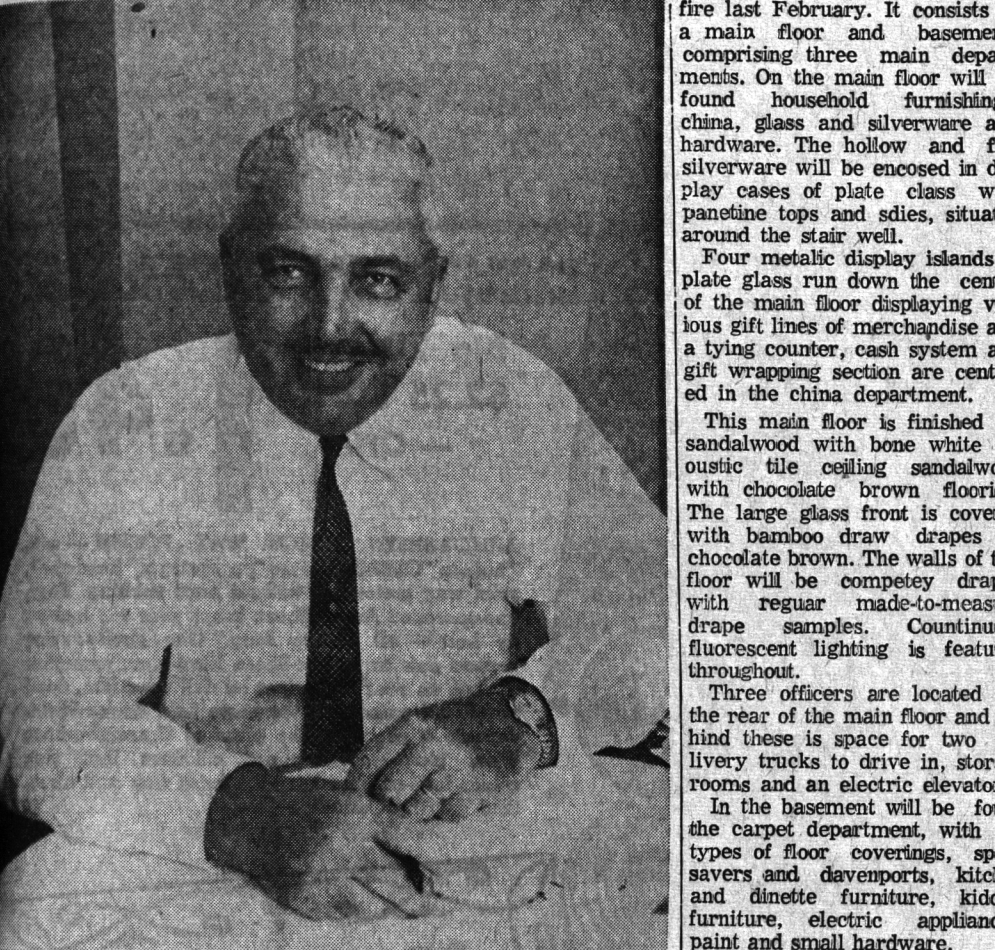
