NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL.

Promised a Position in Justice Department.

Another New Match—The Gillespie Challenge Cup.

OTTAWA, July 23.—It is reported that A. Bruneau, M. P. for Richieu has been promised a position in the Justice Department. Choquette, it will be remembered, complained last session that the Department was without a French-speaking lawyer.

The executive of the Dominion Rifle Association has added a new match, the Gillespie Challenge Cup, to its competitions. This cup is presented by the late T. E. Gillespie, Secretary of the Canada Club, London, together with a medal for the highest aggregate in the match. The cup will be competed for by teams of six and will go to the team making the highest aggregate at 500 and 600 yards in most competitions including the grand aggregate.

Massacre of the Innocents.

LONDON, July 23.—A Madrid despatch states that the bodies of 26 infants in rough boxes have been discovered in the tower of St. Peter's Church, Seville. It is supposed that the wholesale crimes were committed by the church warden and his wife.

Whitelaw Reid's Dinner.

LONDON, July 23.—Whitelaw Reid, the special envoy of the United States to the jubilee festivities, gave a dinner last evening which was attended by the Prince of Wales.

Killed by a Train.

HALIFAX, July 23.—The fourteen year old son of A. L. Melvin, of this city, was knocked off Bedford Bridge by a train last evening and killed.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

MONTREAL, July 21.—The Liberals say that Hon. C. A. Geoffrion took with him to England to be presented to Sir Wilfrid Laurier the resignation of Mr. Madore, M. P. for Hochelaga. Mr. Madore, it appears, intended sending his resignation to the speaker direct, but was induced by Mr. Geoffrion to let it go to Mr. Laurier first.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 21.—Tomorrow at noon the steamship Portland of the Nat. and T. company leaves Seattle for St. Michael's with her passenger accommodations taxed to the limit and with a full cargo of provisions. On the Portland will be the second party of fortune hunters to leave for the Klondyke since the news of the big finds was bought in by the Portland last Sunday.

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 21.—The princess dowager of China has confined Prince Tsai for life in a dungeon for not being present to congratulate her on her birthday and in refusing to worship at the shrine of his ancestors. His title is to be taken away from him and he is to be publicly whipped on the bare back with bamboos until he screams for mercy, after which he is to be shut between four walls and fed on spare diet until he repents. This decree has been published in the court gazette.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., July 21.—The worst explosion since the establishment of the Winchester Repeating Arms Co. in this city, took place at the armory of this company this morning. Six persons were instantly killed, two were fatally injured, and at least a dozen more or less seriously hurt.

OTTAWA, July 21.—G. H. Wilkinson, on behalf of the British Yukon company, made an offer to the minister of the interior to build a wagon road through the White Pass for \$2,000 per mile. The distance is about 50 miles. About eight miles of the road would be very difficult to build. It would take about \$7,000 per mile, being all rock excavation, in the opinion of Mr. Wilkinson, to construct this eight miles. At the rate the people are flocking into this new region something will have to be done soon to provide a way for getting provisions into the mining district. If this road was built Victoria could be reached from the Yukon in about fourteen days, he says.
