CONTRACT BRIDGE

You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has been:

North East South West
1♦ Pass 1♥ Pass
2♦ Pass 2♥ Pass
2♠ Pass ?

What do you now bid with each of the following four hands?

1. ♠K8752 ♥AJ64 ♦— ♣J973
2. ♠AQ93 ♥AJ52 ♣Q864 ♦7
3. ♠AKJ82 ♥KQ53 ♣9 ♦A86
4. ♠KJ94 ♥KQJ6 ♦83 ♣AJ3

QUIZ

1. Pass North obviously doesn't have much of a hand, since he would have bid two spades directly—a more encouraging bid—rather than two diamonds on the preceding round if he had a good hand. Our trump suit, shaky enough to begin with, is not fortified much by the spade preference.

2. Partner apparently has a minimum opening that includes, at best moderate spade support. Since our hand is quite a distance away from an opening bid, we have the situation of an opening bid facing less than an opening bid. This means no game.

3. Five diamonds. This was a game-going hand from the time partner bid a diamond. At the same time there was a strong intimation of a slam.

4. But since then, a couple of things have happened which should slow us down. North made

Publish Verses Written By G.B.S. To Girl Friend

LONDON (AP) — Eighteen verses written by George Bernard Shaw for Ellen Terry, the beautiful actress, were made public Tuesday for the first time. A friend of the actress' family sent them to a London auction room, which placed them on view.

Letters exchanged by Shaw and Miss Terry first were disclosed in 1930, two years after her death at the age of 80. He died in 1950 at 94.

Their romance began when he was a drama critic and she was one of England's most beautiful actresses. He often saw her across the footlights but they seldom met.

SERIES OF LETTERS

In the 1890's and early 1900's their affection for each other was expressed in a series of letters which long have been the subject of great interest for both admirers and critics of Shaw, who was married when he carried on the paper courtship.

The verses made public Tuesday, which did not appear in the published Shaw-Terry letters, include lines that may be attributed to the playwright's famous sense of humor or to his shyness.

One verse reads:

"Lady, wilt thou love me?
Prithae say me ye.
By heaven that's above me
I die if thou say nay."

Another, about the moon reads:

"Through the window thou canst peep,
On her beauty freely gaze."
Possibly referring to the fact that he usually saw her from the audience instead of behind the stage, Shaw wrote:

"And my love, who is my light,
Only shines for other eyes;
Fate, to hide her from my sight
Like a colored cloud doth ever rise."
