CANADIAN FIGS

LANGLEY PRAIRIE, B. C.—(CP)—Alec Forrest grows juicy figs right in his own backyard in this Fraser Valley town. It is believed to be the only fig tree in British Columbia—producing in large quantity and good quality. He planted the tree as a sapling 12 years ago.

Back in 1920, Adam Neigel of Medicine Hat, Alberta, made an agreement with his neighbor that he would kill his wife and that his neighbor would kill her husband. The two would then marry and have two farms. Adam Neigel offered his wife a drink. She took it and died.

Carloadings

OTTAWA, Nov. 12—(CP)—Carloadings on Canadian railways decreased during the week ended Nov. 3 to 84,977 cars compared with 88,260 cars for the previous week and 88,523 cars for the corresponding week a year ago. The Bureau of Statistics reported today that increases were shown in loadings of grain, coal, pulpwood and woodpulp and paper. Declines were registered in loadings of coke, livestock, ore, lumber and gasoline.

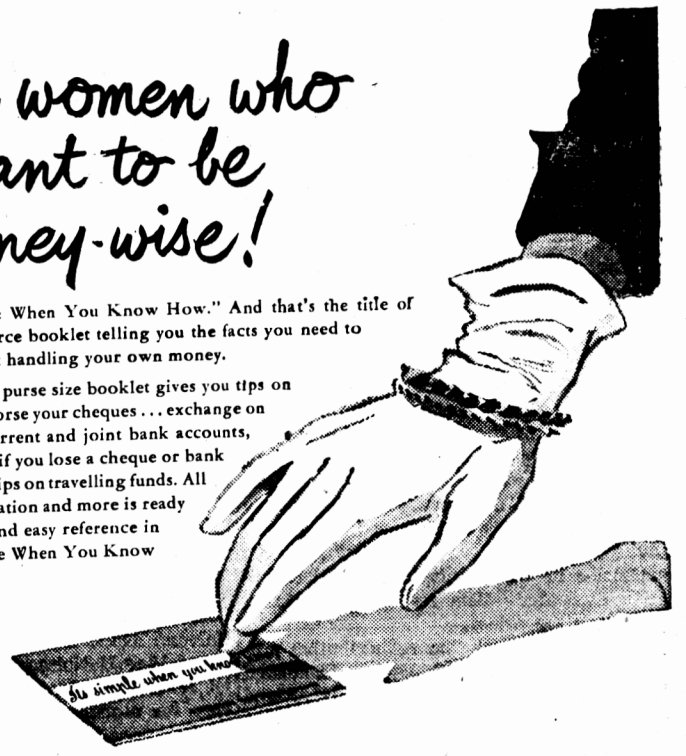
