

# Maglie Turns In Sixth Victory Without Defeat, As Giants Whip Reds 8-3

Sal Maglie turned in his sixth victory without a defeat Wednesday as he pitched the high-flying New York Giants to an 8-3 triumph over the Cincinnati Reds.

The victory was the Giants' fifth straight and their 16th in their last 16 starts. Maglie's first six-hitter also enabled the Giants to increase their National League lead to two games over the second-place Brooklyn Dodgers. The Dodgers dropped a 5-1 decision to Gerry Staley and St. Louis Cardinals.

Maglie's mates opened up a 4-0 lead in two innings. Bobby Thomson tripled and stole home in the first inning against K'n Raffensberger. Home runs by army-bound Willie Mays and West Westrum in the second accounted for three more runs and that was more than Maglie needed. The Giants added two more in the fifth and another pair in the eighth for good measure.

Red shortstop Roy McMillan celebrated his clinching of the shortstop berth with a homer in the fifth inning.

Staley also came up with a six-hitter for the Cards. Andy Pafko's eighth homer of the season in the fifth inning accounted for Brooklyn's only run.

The Cards also collected only six safeties from Chris Van Cuyk and Ralph Branca but they included a home run and triple by Solly Hemus who drove in three runs.

Card manager Ed Stanky shook up his infield. Stanky installed at first, replacing Stan Musial who returned to his first love, the outfield. Red Schoendienst moved from third to second, replacing Stanky and Billy Johnson returned to third. Hemus remained at short.

Sisler failed to hit in four trips but drove home the first run of the game with a fly ball in the second inning.

Philadelphia Phillies swamped Chicago Cubs 9-2 and Boston Braves edged Pittsburgh Pirates 4-3 in 10 innings in remaining National League games. In the only American League day games, Detroit Tigers ripped Washington Senators 3-2 and Chicago White Sox stopped Boston Red Sox 6-3 in a game called after seven innings because of rain.

Russ Meyer, the Phils' hard luck right-hander, gained his first victory in five decisions in beating the Cubs. Willie Jones and Gran Hamner led the Phil attack, driving home six runs. Jones knocked in four on his fourth homer and a single. Hamner drove home two on a homer, triple and single.

Rookie Pete Whisenant's infield hit with the bases loaded and two out in the tenth beat the Pirates. Gus Bell homered in the top of the tenth to give Pittsburgh a 3-2 lead but rookie George Crowe tied it up for Boston with a pinch-hit homer and set the stage for Whisenant.

Vic Wertz cracked an eighth-inning homer to snap a 2-2 tie and give Detroit the nod over Washington. Sid Hudson was the victim of Wertz' blast. Art Houtteman limited the Senators to six hits in gaining his third victory.

Rookie left-hander Bill Henry, gunning for his fifth victory without a loss, blanked the White Sox for five innings but blew up in the sixth and seventh, giving Detroit six runs as the Red Sox went down to their sixth straight defeat. Winning pitcher Saul Rogovin helped his own cause with a two-run homer.

In night games, New York Yankees tangled with the Indians in Cleveland and St. Louis Browns entertained Philadelphia Athletics.

## Ring Reminiscences

— Fights and Fighters —  
(By James Pendergast)

On a journey from Dease Lake Landing in the Cassiar country of British Columbia to Level Mountain (the "divides" between the Pacific Coast rivers and the Liard and other rivers of the McKenzie system), the trail in one place led through a grassy hollow of two or three acres in extent. When the old timer partner and I got about 30 or 40 miles beyond, and into a very grassy, moose pasture, he admonished me to keep a few steps ahead of my dogs, which had our provisions in dog packs on their backs. This was to prevent them from stampeding after moose. I must have been sleep-walking in the drowsy August weather—fighting mosquitoes also—because the dogs did get a few feet ahead of me. I noticed the dogs perk up their ears. A short distance away three moose were walking in single file, reminding one of elephants in a circus parade. I thought it would be easy to sprint ahead of the dogs, but several days tramping over moss and grass had a grievous slowing effect. The dogs quickened their speed at the same instant as I did, and the result was a tragedy.

# Cleveland Barons Hear Requirements For NHL

TORONTO, May 14—(CP)—Application for membership in the National Hockey League by Cleveland Barons hockey club was suspended today at a closed meeting of the N.H.L. board of governors. The Barons have until June 1 to meet certain undisclosed financial arrangements.

Final announcement will be made at the N.H.L.'s annual meeting at Montreal June 10-11. President Clarence Campbell told a press conference after the hour-long meeting.

But both Campbell and general manager Jim Hendy of the Barons expressed confidence that the American Hockey League club will be the seventh team in the big league when the season rolls around next September.

"If Cleveland meets the financial conditions stipulated by the governors, it is almost a certainty they will be in the N.H.L. next season," Campbell said.

"I believe our stockholders will fulfill the request for admission into the N.H.L.," Hendy told reporters. "If they vote to carry out the requirements at a board of directors meeting in Cleveland May 24, we're in."

Campbell said that the N.H.L. board of governors considered all aspects of Cleveland's request for membership—its geographical position in relation to other N.H.L. clubs, its arena, team prospects, administration know-how, working capital—and that they asked only that certain "interior finances" of the club be arranged.

Campbell disclosed that the franchise price for Cleveland would be \$50,000 if admitted into the league. The club's equity in the N.H.L.'s reserve would cost the team another \$57,000.

Campbell will go to Cleveland at a "date suitable to the club's directors" to discuss the whole question.

If Cleveland is admitted into the big time, the present 70-game schedule will be raised to 72, with 36 games at home and 36 away for each team. Campbell, who will start work at once on alternative schedules—one with Cleveland in the other on the present six-team basis—said the season would not be lengthened by admission of the Barons.

The N.H.L. president said also that the governors did not consider player help for the Barons.

"If we get in, it will be dog eat dog and we'll be in there smiling," Hendy said.

Cleveland, which has no tie up with any N.H.L. team, has a farm system extending from British Columbia to Ontario. They have a farm club at Crow's Nest Pass in B.C., juvenile, midget, and bantam and junior "A" teams in Winnipeg and working agreements with St. Catharines Teepees of the Ontario Hockey Association Junior "A" series.

In addition, the Barons own most of the players with Seattle of the Western League.

# Mexican Fighter Wins Lightweight Ch'ship

LOS ANGELES, May 14—(AP)—Lauro Salas of Monterrey, Mexico, won the world lightweight championship from Jimmy Carter of New York by a decision in 13 rounds tonight.

It was a split decision. Referee Frank Van gave the decision to Carter by one point but the two judges, Joe Stone and Minsky Callahan called it for Salas by margins of two and three points.

The wildest scene of pandemonium broke loose in the Olympic Auditorium when the decision was announced.

The decision was a sad blow to Carter, the 28-year-old veteran in his 75th fight and his third defeat of the crow he won a year ago from Ike Williams.

Tonight's outcome, viewed by millions of television fans in the United States, provided the same upset as Carter's win over Williams. Carter was little known when he knocked out Ike in the 14th. Salas was equally obscure, as far as the championship was concerned.

Salas, who holds the featherweight championship of California, brought the crowd to its feet in the second round when he staggered Carter with two terrific swinging rights to the jaw, and he kept them in an uproar as he put on a furious rally to win the final four rounds.

Salas' victory was the first time a native of Mexico had won undisputed claim to the lightweight championship. Juan Zurita held the National Boxing Association version of the title several years ago.

Salas, one of the few who were confident of victory tonight after his last encounter with Carter, was lifted to the shoulders of his managers and seconds. While numerous others climbed into the ring, Lauro was borne about the ropes, waving and shouting to his admirers in the roaring gallery.

Carter, who will get a return match and a chance to regain the title, congratulated Lauro and let the ring quickly.

It was Carter's first defeat in seven bouts since winning the title.

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
