

Keen Competition As Provincial Rifle Ass'n Meet Gets Underway

Some sixty marksmen took part in the opening day's matches of the Provincial Rifle Ass'n's seventy-eighth annual prize meeting held over the Squaw Point Range during yesterday morning and afternoon, that produced excellent scores and close competition, necessitating three shoot-offs out of the four matches held, before the winners could be declared.

In the opening match of the big four-day meeting, Corporal W. M. DeBlois of the R.C.M.P. won the DeBlois Brothers Ltd. Match after a shoot-off with Gunner W. Crockett and Constable A.M. Johnston, who all ended up in a three-way deadlock with scores of 49, one away from a possible. The match consisted of 10 rounds from the 200 yard range.

Competing in the Prowse Brothers Ltd. Match, 10 shots at the 300 yard range, Captain A. J. McCabe and Sgt. G. G. MacLennan, both of the P.E.I. Regiment, also came up with tie 49's. Both had to compete in an extra shoot-off which was finally won by McCabe.

Scoring two of the three possible records during the day's events, Sergeant Eric Coles, P.E.I. Regiment, and Sergeant W. Quigley, Halifax, scored 50 points each from 500 yards in the Moore and McLeod Match, to bring about the third shoot-off of the day. Sgt. Coles was the final winner, who also held the distinction of having the highest aggregate score in the opening day's shoot. Coles rang up a total of 192 points, only eight below a perfect score.

Representing the P. E. I. Regiment, Trooper W. Gamble copped off top honors in the Cameron-Vinnicombe Match, when he came through with the only other possible of the day, a 50 from the 600 yard range. Major A. F. Gormley and Corporal A. Rodd, also of the P.E.I. Regt., tied for second in the match with 48 each.

Miss Mary MacLennan, City, and Miss Elsie Strong of Windsor, N.S., the only two lady competitors, made excellent showings. Miss MacLennan scored a 47 and two 46's in three of four matches, while Miss Strong garnered scores of 47 and 44 in the two matches she competed in.

Miss Strong, who is here competing with her father, Gunner C. C. Strong, are two of three competitors from the Mainland taking part in the meet, the other being Sgt. W. Quigley of Halifax, who tied for first place with Sgt. Coles in the Moore and McLeod Match.

The second day's meeting will commence this morning with the City of Charlottetown Match to be followed later in the day with the British Consols Match. Both competitions will be double matches, the former from the 300 and 500 yard ranges, and the latter from the 600 and 500 yards.

Philadelphia Athletics To Remain In Mack Family

PHILADELPHIA, July 31—(AP)—Philadelphia Athletics of the American Baseball League, valued at nearly \$3,500,000, are going to stay in the Mack family.

Today Roy and Earle Mack — eldest sons of Connie Mack who has managed the A's since the American League was founded 59 years ago — announced they expect to buy a controlling interest in the club. The two brothers would take over 75 per cent of the club's stock. They now own 24 per cent between them.

Connie himself owns 20 per cent of the 1,500 shares. This stock is not up for sale.

Roy and Earle have taken a 30-day option to purchase 58 per cent of the stock for nearly \$2,000,000 from their half-brother, Connie Mack, Jr., Mrs. Connie Mack, Sr., and relatives of the late Benjamin F. and Thomas Shibe, former presidents of the club.

Connie, Jr., placed the \$3,500,000 value on the club. This includes Shibe Park, the American League franchise and a number of minor league clubs.

Should Roy and Earle fail to exercise the option the group headed by Connie, Jr., can buy the controlling interest.

In either case — all three sons note — Connie, Sr., often called "Mr. Baseball" and now celebrating his 50th anniversary as manager, will stay at the helm.

"Dad can manage as long as he wants to," Roy, Earle and Connie, Jr., insist.

Purchase of the controlling interest by the two Macks is expected to bring "peace" to an organization allegedly broken up and mismanaged because of internal dissension.

It was Connie, Jr., against Roy and Earle. Because Connie, Jr., headed a group that controlled the club's stock, he inevitably won out.

Connie, Jr., said "differences of opinion" made it impossible "for us to continue operating under the present arrangement."

Officials of the Abegweit Amateur Athletic Club stated last night that they will send a team to compete in the Maritime Junior Track and Field championships to be held at the Wanderers A.A.C. grounds on August 9th, which is a week from tomorrow.

Most of the athletes who have competed in the junior division of the Abbie track and field squad in competitions so far this season, are all expected to take part in the Halifax meet, many of whom, participated in yesterday's meet at New Glasgow, N.S. with the senior team. The results of their efforts were not known at time of writing, but will be found on the sport page of this edition.

But their accomplishments in other meets this year are well known to supporters here, and it is expected that the Abbie representatives will make a strong bid for top honors in the forthcoming junior championships. In the two major Maritime meets so far this season, the Abbie junior team garnered a first and a second against other leading mainland entries, as well as coping off many individual honors.

In the Maritime Invitation Track and Field championships held here at Memorial Field on July first (Dominion Day) they compiled a total of 33 points over the junior Halifax Wanderers squad and later in the month placed second in junior competition at the Antigonish Highland games. The junior squad are expected to turn out each evening all this week in preparation for the meet.

A few days ago in this column we outlined some situations regarding balks by pitchers as laid down by Billy Evans in his "Knotty Problems of Baseball," who claims that most fans and players too, know less about the rules governing balks than any other rules of the game. In the event this is so (and he should know, having been an umpire in the American League for 22 years) and is now general manager of the Detroit Baseball Club, here are a few more questions and answers regarding balks for the benefit of local enthusiasts.

"A runner on first base, a very fast man, took a big lead off that base. The pitcher on rubber noted this and just as he started his delivery, the runner broke for second. It was quite apparent that the pitcher intentionally dropped the ball, then hurriedly picked it up, threw to second and retired the runner on a close play. Can this be legally done?"

"It can not. When the pitcher starts his delivery to the batsman, he must complete it or make a balk. Accidentally or intentionally dropping the ball automatically makes a balk of it. The runner was not out at second, but entitled to remain there, since the calling of the balk entitled him to advance one base — in this case from first to second." Were you familiar with that one? Yes — No! Well, here is another one anyway.

"With a runner on first base, the pitcher delivered the ball to the batsman while no foot was in contact with the rubber. The pitch was a perfect strike. How shall the umpire interpret such a situation, which actually started with an improper pitch?"

tact with the pitching rubber, must be construed as a balk by the umpire. The calling of the balk voids the pitch, therefore no consideration can be given to the fact that it was a perfect strike. It was an illegal pitch. The ball became dead with the calling of the balk. The proper interpretation of the play is simple. It was a balk that in no way affected the status of the batter but did entitle the runner on first to advance to second. The perfect strike was voided because the calling of the balk immediately suspended all action on the pitch."

Important Game For Knights And Vics Tonight

George Kell Three Points Up On Larry Doby

CHICAGO, July 31—(AP)—Detroit's George Kell gained seven points in the American League batting race last week for a pacesetter, 351, three ahead of Cleveland's Larry Doby.

Official figures, computed through Sunday's games, shows Kell has 135 hits in 385 abs, compared with Doby's 110 in 316 for 348. Doby, who trailed by a point last week, picked up five points.

Detroit's Hoot Evers, tied with Doby at 343 last week, slumped seven points into a third-place tie with Johnny Pesky of Boston at 336. Others in the top 10 include Walt Dropp, Boston, 332; Yogi Berra, New York, 328; Al Zarilla, Boston, 324; Phil Rizzuto, New York, 321; Johnny Groth, Detroit, 320; and Vic Wertz, Detroit, 313.

Kell continued as a double leader in the specialized departments with most hits, 135, and most two-baggers, 31. Boston's Vern Stephens kept ahead in runs with 85, and R.B.I.'s with 100.

Cleveland's Al Rosen remained home-run leader, picking up two during the week for a total of 29. Boston's Dom DiMaggio stayed ahead in stolen bases with 10.

The league's leading percentage pitcher was Cleveland's Bob Lemon, with a 16-4 record for .800.

Feud May Spark Phillies To League Pennant

PHILADELPHIA, July 31—(AP)—A friendly feud between Del Ennis and Willie (Puddin' Head) Jones may spark the league-leading Philadelphia Phillies to their first National League pennant in 35 years.

Big Del and Willie — roommates — are feuding base hit style. Ennis has 18 runs on 11 hits for 26 times at bat, including two doubles, a triple, and four home runs, two with the bases loaded.

Willie has made seven for 22, batted in five runs and numbers a homer, two doubles and four singles in his collection.

"Maybe I'd do better if my pal wasn't knocking the ball out of the lot all the time," Willie said.

"He goes up to the plate and asks me: 'Shall I leave you a couple or knock 'em all in?' I tell him to give me a chance. Then he belts the ball over the roof. Or he promises: 'Be ready Willie, I'll be on second. Drive me in.' But instead of him being on second, he's trotting around the bases with a big grin on his face and the fans yelling."

Sunday, Jones had a chance to reverse the procedure on Ennis. Willie was batting third, just ahead of Ennis, with two on. Jones rapped a double and two runs romped across tying the game. Up came Ennis and he smashed the first pitch — umpire Bill Stewart said it was a foot inside and low — into the left field stands for a home run.

"That's what I mean," said Jones. "That guy Ennis isn't satisfied to drive me in. He has to belt the ball into the stands."

Five Fighters Have Failed To Win Back Heavyweight Title

NEW YORK, July 31—(AP)—Five fighters have tried unsuccessfully to do what Joe Louis will try to do — win back the heavyweight title.

Jim Corbett tried it twice, at the ages of 33 and 36. Corbett had won the title from John L. Sullivan in 1892, and lost it to Bob Fitzsimmons at Carson City, Nev., in 1897.

Before Corbett could get another crack at Fitz, the latter had lost the crown to Jim Jeffries. In 1900 Corbett made his first bid for his old job as heavyweight king.

He met Jeffries in New York and was knocked out in 23 rounds. Three years later he again was knocked out by Jeff, this time in 10 rounds.

Jeffries also wrecked the comeback hopes of Fitzsimmons, whom he gave another shot at the title in 1902. Jeff won that one in eight rounds.

Jeff abdicated, you might say, in 1905 when he had licked all available contenders, but five years later he was prevailed upon to try to regain the crown from Jack Johnson, an unpopular champion.

Jeff, then a bald, puffy hollow shell, was knocked out by Johnson in 15 rounds. There were no further attempts of ex-champs to regain their lost crown until Jack Dempsey, who had lost the championship to Gene Tunney the year before, failed to win it back when they met in the famous "battle of the long count" in Chicago in 1927.

The fifth former champion to try to upset precedent was Max Schmeling, who, in that extra round between Tunney and Louis, had gained recognition as title holder by the elegant performance of sitting on the floor, clutching his groin, and contorting his face in agony.

Schmeling lost the decision and the title in his next outing with Sharkey, but got a chance to win it back later, to his own regret. By that time Louis had ascended the throne, and Louis had developed a wholesome hate for the glowering German. Joe annihilated him in one round.
