

## Exciting Fishing Trip Is Reported From North Side

There seems to be lots of variety these days for those who love to go deep sea fishing around the north shore of P.E.I. and perhaps the climax was reached a day or so ago when a group of five went fishing off Rustico for mackerel and pollock and when out about three miles found their boat practically encircled by a group of playful large black fish which are really a smaller branch of the whale family.

However, in this case there were two very large ones which the boat owner and the others estimated to be at least as large as the boat. Every now and then the two larger ones blew water up in the air about ten feet. The entire group came along side of the boat which was anchored at the time and gradually circled around for about half an hour giving a close splendid view of their antics.

Three of the men in the party Mr. Andy Yukinia, Mr. Ted Horne, Mr. Lloyd Hewton were from Alberta and Mr. Ron Viger, from Texas. These men are connected with the Seismograph group doing work here for Imperial Oil Limited, and were taken on the trip by Mr. B. Graham Rogers of the Department of Industry and Natural Resources. The sight of these large fish was quite a thrill to them. After the black fish and whales left they continued fishing and had good catches.

"The fine building and its facilities, the energetic Board of Directors and the enthusiasm of the volunteer leaders and members of the various Clubs and Groups, presents an opportunity of almost unlimited service," he said.

Mr. Evans stated that following one of the most successful summer camping seasons at the Y.M.C.A. Camp site at Holland Cove in which 83 boys and 111 girls participated, the "Y" is preparing to begin fall scale activities on Tuesday, October 1st. **VARIED PROGRAM**

He outlined the season's program which includes practically every member of the family from "eight to eighty."

For boys and girls age 8-11, who for "Y" purpose are classed as "Juniors," there will be GRA-Y Clubs, Gym classes, Group games, crafts, showers and movies, plus Junior Hi-Y Clubs for those attending High School and also the Hi-Y Teen Age parties on Friday evenings.

## Tenants In Housing Units May Now Become Owners

The houses in the 29 rental unit on Alexander Drive and Oriabar Street will be offered for sale on October 1, according to information received from Heath Macquarrie, M.P., who states that approval of the sale has been given by the Atlantic Regional Office of the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation in Halifax.

If the tenant is not in purchasing the unit which he occupies, or if he is not presently in a position to purchase, he will be permitted to remain in occupancy on a monthly basis in accordance with the terms of the existing lease.

The houses were erected in 1948. The sale price will be \$7,130 for each of the four 4-roomed bungalows and \$7,630 for each of the 25 five room 1 1/2 story units.

The above prices are subject to a \$1,000 rebate which may be earned by the purchaser by his remaining in occupancy for a two year period. The rebate is earned at the rate of one twenty-fourth of the total for each completed month of owner occupancy.

## Biggest Uranium Producer In World At Blind River

ELLIOT LAKE, Ont. (CP)—A mine that was little more than a dream three years ago was officially opened Sunday.

Already Consolidated Denison in the Blind River field is the world's biggest single uranium producer. It started operations last May and now is milling 4,000 tons of ore a day. In another two months the rate will be 6,000 tons.

Its president, Stephen Roman, who came to Canada from Slovakia 20 years ago, pressed the button starting mill machinery in the formal ceremony.

**OUR BEST HOPE**  
Lester B. Pearson, former external affairs minister and Commons member for Algoma East, at an evening banquet said the mine's production will help the western world prepare for massive retaliation in event of atomic attack — "our best hope for peace until something better can be worked out."

Arthur Maloney, parliamentary assistant to the labor minister, forecast that within a few years uranium will contribute more to the Canadian economy than any other base metal and most of it would come from the Blind River field.

Denison has a contract for sale of uranium oxide worth \$201,910,000 to the crown-owned Eldorado Mining and Refining Company by March 31, 1963. It is the fourth of the Blind River field's 11 mines to start production. Pronto was opened two years ago and two Algomines — Quirk and Nordic — earlier this year. The Algomines are the world's second largest, each with a 3,000-ton mill.

## 5 Cases Heard By Magistrate

A Hunter River youth who pleaded guilty to willful damage to property in Queen's County magistrate's Court yesterday evening was fined \$10 and costs and ordered to pay three dollars for damage done, in default of which he was sentenced to five days imprisonment in Queen's County Jail Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet presided.

In addition, three speeders were fined \$10 and costs or ten days, and a party charged with failing to report an accident in which damages totalled approximately \$250, was fined \$20 and costs, or 20 days.

In all but one case, the informations were laid by members of the RCMP. Mr. John P. Nicholson represented the Crown. Mr. Gerald Foster appeared on behalf of a client.

Others to act as local chairmen in the outside centres will be contacted as soon as possible and will then be announced. The Lions Clubs of Summerside and Kensington were most progressive with their collections and it is hoped will act again this year.
