Winter Fair Dairy Booth

The idea of a Dairy Booth for the Maritime Winter Fair was originally promoted by the Maritime Federation of Agriculture and a committee of three was set up to do the planning. The success of the venture is however to a large extent due to cash grants made by the three Maritime Dairy Associations and to the skilled and untiring efforts of officials from the dairy branches of Departments of Agriculture.

A complete selection of the various dairy products made by practically every Maritime firm is displayed in an attractive manner and forms a very effective method of bringing to public attention the significance of the industry.

Free samples of cottage and cheddar cheese are proving extremely popular and can hardly fail to stimulate the consumers appetite for these products in particular and all dairy products in general.

Milk—42 Cents Quart

The C. I. L. Agricultural News says that from a nutritional and economic standpoint milk is the best bargain on the market. They have broken down a quart of milk on the basis of proteins, minerals and vitamins and compared these elements with the prices of other foods. Their findings were that one quart of milk contains 38 cents worth of protein, 2 and one-half cents worth of fat, one-half cent worth of vitamins and minerals and one cent worth of sugar, making a total of 42 cents. The protein value is worked out on the basis of the present price of beef and pork roasts.

Potato Question

In addition to the meetings held on the Pool Marketing of potatoes and the radio broadcast it was felt desirable to publicize to the press a number of questions and answers which were felt to be of particular interest and importance.

The material published was in no sense propaganda, it was so far as possible factual and was not intended to influence producers one way or another.

It was felt that farmers required and were entitled to this information in order that a reasonable decision could be arrived at. Statement or any question may be open to different interpretation, so far as the advertisement in question is concerned, care was taken to avoid misleading statements and to present the information as fairly as possible.

Up and Down

The index number of Canadian farm prices declined 10 points in August from the July figure of 250. A year ago in August the index figure on the market was 272, on the other side of the ledger the cost of index of commodities and services used by the farmers increased slightly but is down slightly from the previous year's August figures. Wages paid on farms increased 27 percent between April and August.

These figures may be fairly dry reading but they do indicate a condition which is causing real and understandable concern to farm people, a condition which if continued or aggravated cannot fail to cause serious dislocations in the whole economy.

The operation of a farm on a profitable basis is not a simple matter under the best of conditions and declining returns and increasing costs place a strain on the farm economy which many

Farm Forum got under way last Monday night with a discussion on the relationship between the farmer and the agricultural fieldman. Next Monday night the discussion group will wrestle with the proper status of farm women in relation to the farm business.

A special invitation has gone out to the Women's Institutes to meet as a group on that evening preferably with the men folk and to report their opinions to the Farm Forum office.

On the night of November 23 a new feature will be introduced with a panel of speakers presenting as a Maritime effort a discussion on the topic "Are farm organizations the answer?" For that particular night Canada has divided itself for Farm Forum purposes into four regions each of which has chosen its own topic.
