Montreal, which carried a two-game losing streak into the game, battled back for a two-goal deficit in the second period with tally by Henri Richard, Ralph Backstrom and Claude Stan to take a 2-3 lead, Chicago, which had lost its last four games, had gained the edge on first-period goals by Stan Mikita and Pat Stapleton.

BOSTON 2, TORONTO 1 BOSTON (CP)—Phil Martin and Murray Oliver scored goals in a frantic second period Sunday night and Boston Bruins held on for a 2-1 National Hockey League victory over Toronto Maple Leafs.

Tim Horton got the Toronto goal in the third period. It marked the first time this season the lowly Bruins have been able to string together three victories in a row and it enabled Boston to climb to within two points of the fifth-place New York Rangers.

Boston was engaged in a melee for the third straight game but this time the squabble, between Boston's Gilles Marotte and Kent Douglas of Toronto, came well less than two minutes to play and the teams finished up shorthanded.

Toronto pulled goalie Johnny Bower with well over a minute to play but the Bruins couldn't get a shot on the empty net. Boston outshot Toronto 22-8 in the middle period and, except for the spectacular work of the veteran Bower, would have taken a sizeable lead.

Massengale Wins Open Palmer's Charge Not Ample

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP) Texan Don Massengale conquered the monster Pebble Beach course Sunday with some great putting to capture his first major pro golf title in the \$104,500 Bing Crosby tournament with a two-under-par 70 and 283 total.

The 29-year-old Texas Christian University graduate raced out in front with four birdies and an eagle on his first nine holes and then stood off the challenges of Arnold Palmer, Al Geiberger and Billy Martinale to take the \$11,000 first prize.

Massengale, from Jacksonville, Tex., said he was unafraid of the 6,747-yard Pebble Beach layout and proved it.

The 190-pound Massengale dropped a 25-foot putt for his eagle on the 497-yard, par-five, second hole. He sank a 15-footer on the third and from 20 and 27 feet on the seventh and eighth to make the run-in 32 after one

one-over-par hole when he missed the green at the fifth. RACE TIGHTENED When he went one over par on three of the first five holes on the back nine, the race tightened and it was not until he dropped a birdie putt of four feet at 18 that he shut out Palmer, who finished second with a 284 after a 71. Arnie was one group behind and even though he birdied the 15th, 16th and 18th, his patented charge fell short.

Still, he collected the \$6,200 prize. Geiberger, the leader after the first and third rounds, soared to a 76 and 285 total to tie for third with Martinale, who had tied for second after the third round. Martinale carded a 73 for his final round.

Chuck Courtney, who had only a 292 score, teamed with Dr. John L. Moler to win the promoter title in a playoff. Dr. Moler scored a net four on the first extra hole to earn \$4,000 for his pro partner.

Pebble Beach lived up to its monster reputation for several of the golfers, including 1965 leading money winner Jack Nicklaus, who took a nine on the final hole for a 76 and 285. Massengale finished four strokes under par for the full tournament, one in which each must play rounds over three courses — Monterey Peninsula Country Club, Cypress Point and Pebble—before reaching the finals.

Massengale shot 70 at Cypress, 67 at Monterey and a 76 on his first round at Pebble to go into the finals four strokes behind Geiberger.

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Saints Topped Again

HALIFAX (CP)—St. Mary's University Huskies' downed St. Dunstan's University Saints 104-64 in a Maritime Intercollegiate Conference Basketball game here Saturday.

It was the third in a week for the Huskies, the second over St. Dunstan's. They edged Mount Allison Hawks 93-86 Friday and dumped St. Dunstan's 121-65 at Charlottetown last Saturday. The Huskies now have four wins in six starts.

Jim Daniels led St. Mary's with 21 points in Saturday's game and guard Joe O'Reilly added 18. Mike Sullivan paced St. Dunstan's with 17 followed by Ed Lawlor who had 14. St. Mary's led 63-28 at half time.

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BRAINTREE, Mass. (AP)—Charlottetown Royals whipped the under-manned Braintree Eastern Olympic Club 4-3 Sunday in an exhibition hockey game. Sandy Murphy and Al Arsenault each scoring twice for the winners.
