It is said to have been decided to light the new Welland Canal by the electric light.

The Intercolonial Railway officials are making enquiries for a vessel to carry 20,000 bushels of wheat from Halifax to London, and the lowest rate that will be accepted for ocean freight. The shipment depends upon the rate of ocean freight.

The Ottawa Citizen publishes the full text of a circular letter and a set of instructions issued by Hon. Edward Blake and sent to prominent Reformers for the purpose of guiding them during the election campaign.

The wife of the new Chinese Minister, a lady of high rank in her own country, will not at present enter Washington Society. She speaks only her own language, her little feet will not permit her to go about unsupported, and she is, to crown all, exceedingly bashful.

Resolutions asking the New York State Legislature to authorize a submission of the question of making the State Canals free to a vote of the electors of the State, are likely to be adopted by that body this winter. But it is thought that a large majority of the people will vote against that measure, as it means increased taxation.

Governor Long, of Massachusetts, ought to be a particularly happy man. He is the youngest and most promising of all American Governors, and he recently had the distribution of most extensive patronage. On Monday he appointed three Judges. Judge Morton was nominated Chief Justice of the State, vice Chief Justice Gray, called to the Supreme Court of the United States; Hon. Charles Allan was appointed successor to Judge Morton, and Mr. Caleb Blodgett appointed to the Superior Court, vice Judge Putnam, deceased.

A scientific writer in the Mark Lane Express says: "The flavor of beef is due to juices, and if, during cooking, these be allowed to escape, the beef loses much of its taste. Hence, in broiling, it should from the outset be exposed to a bright, quick fire, which, by causing the superficial fibres to at once contract and the albuminous juice near the surface to coagulate, leads to the plugging up of the surface pores, and consequent retention of the juices. Similarly, in boiling, beef should be plunged into almost boiling water. On the other hand, in making beef tea, cold water is poured on chopped beef and gradually heated to draw the nutrient of the beef into the water."
