Graduate Gives Address At City Rotary Meeting

Colin MacMillan of Charlottetown, a graduate of Saint Dunstan's University who was chosen for a Rhodes Scholarship, was guest speaker at the regular meeting of the Charlottetown Rotary Club yesterday afternoon. His talk dealt with the differences in attitudes and ways of life at Oxford, the college system there, it's teaching system and student life. Composed of a series of independent colleges, Oxford with a population of 10,000 students of which about 500 are American, is concentrating on how best it can serve the modern world, said Mr. MacMillan. The school year which runs from October to June doesn't leave much time for extra reading which the students must catch up on during his holiday period. Anyone who intends on going to Oxford, he said, should decide what he or she wants to do when he gets there. One shouldn't be surprised what one may hear or see from these different types of people within the university itself, he said. Chou En-lai Reveals Skill As New Purge Sweeps China

LONDON (AP)—Chou En-lai, the Mandarin turned revolutionist, once again has shown his skill at self-preservation in the purge sweeping China.

One British commentator called the 69-year-old premier the Mikoyan of China. This was a reference to Anastas I. Mikoyan, the Armenian who served Stalin loyally, denounced him after his death, survived a series of Soviet power struggles and retired with his head still high in 1955.

When rumblings of the purge began coming from China this spring there were some who thought Chou had links with those branded as the "anti-party" gang.

But the new lineup of the hierarchy emerging from Peking shows Chou still premier and in the third spot—behind Mao Tse-tung and his latest heir-apparent, Marshal Lin Biao. Chou quickly swung on the bandwagon and pledged support to 59-year-old Lin, who last week moved openly to the top as Mao's right-hand man in place of Liu Shao-chi.

Chou seems resigned to being Peking's bridesmaid and never his bride and this could account for his manoeuvrability in political fighting.

The Economist, highly respected British weekly journal of opinion, said of the Peking changes:

"The army's prestige and power in China have surely risen with that of their commander (Defence Minister Lin Biao) at the expense of the party machine. The other victors in this climax of the cultural revolution seem to have been the economic realists."

Pointing out that Chen Yun, the economic planner who disappeared in the party struggle after the failure of the 1958 "great leap forward," had had moved back into the No. 10 place in the hierarchy, The Economist said:

"He and Chou En-lai, usually identified as an economic 'moderate' who opposed the great leap, may have struck a bargain with Mao and Lin to leave the economy alone in return for their support of the tough measures of the last few months' purge."

Canada Packers Surprised At Statement Made By Union

TORONTO (CP) — Canada Packers Ltd. spokesmen Monday expressed surprise at a statement Saturday from the United Packinghouse, Food and Allied Workers union that there is no hope for a resumption of negotiations on a new contract until after Labor Day.

The union struck eight Canada Packers plants across Canada July 20. Talks between the two sides have been going on intermittently. About 5,300 workers have been left idle.

"Canada Packers finds it amazing that the union feels two more weeks must go by before negotiations can resume in a strike costing workers more than half a million dollars in lost wages a week, the company said in a statement.

"The workers have already lost \$2,500,000 in wages, a loss of about \$500 for each worker. The company is also suffering substantial losses." A company spokesman said the union has not called in its full bargaining committee since the strike began.

Talks to date have dealt with the strike generally, and indicated a wide gap between management and the union on the "open" issue of Starfighter jets. The company has offered a 44-cent financial package that includes a wage increase and other benefits in a two-year contract.

W. German Air Chief Is Suspended

BONN (Reuters)—West Germany's air force chief was suspended from duty Monday after attacking the government's policy on a wave of crashes by U.S.-designed Starfighter jets.

Gen. Werner Panitzki demanded that a central authority be responsible for all Starfighter matters and called for a reorganized defence ministry. His demands were made in an interview with the newspaper Neue Ruhr Zeitung of Essen, which favors the opposition Social Democrat party.

Panitzki, 55, offered his resignation on Aug. 12, eight days before the interview. He said it was the greatest disappointment of his life to hear criticisms of the air force from all sides.

Sixty-one of the \$1,500,000 planes have crashed, killing 36 airmen, since 1961. Complexities in the German-built version of the plane have been blamed.

MINISTER CHARGED
The latest victim, Lieut. Siegfried Arndt, 33, was buried Monday at Flensburg. His widow was taken to hospital and his father filed charges of negligent homicide against Defence Minister Kai-Uwe von Hassel.

The minister also has been under intense fire over a series of corruption cases in his ministry but he has refused to even consider resigning.

The Social Democrats demanded his resignation in an angry debate on the Starfighter in May, and informed sources said they would renew the onslaught in the fall parliamentary session.
