Royal training begins almost in the cradle and already Prince Charles has learned to wave and smile at the crowds who cheer him when he goes out in one of Princess Elizabeth's big, dark green limousines and to give a little bow to the Queen and Queen Mary when they come into the nursery. He also knows how to be considerate of "Baby Sister," as he calls Princess Anne, as yet unable to pronounce her name properly. When she is asleep there must be "lots of hush" as Prince Charles explains.

The little Prince has just been delighted with the gift of a puppy, a brown and white Welsh Corgi terrier which is the favorite breed with the Royal Family. Christened "Sugar" it is now his constant companion, though jealously resented by Princess Elizabeth's two terriers, Shandy and Punch. The former usually accompanies the procession when Nurse Lightbody takes the children for their afternoon outing, escorted by the Scotland Yard detective who is responsible for their personal safety and who must always be on duty whenever they leave their home.
